NorthWest Apple Pickers Board Meeting Report, March 3rd, 2009

The Executive Board was called to order at 7:03 p.m. and adjourned at 8:15 p.m. at President Camp's home. One Board member was absent. Two guests, Fred Battié and Peter Winderling, were present. This was the first meeting held on the first Tuesday of the month.

Treasurer Berglund reported a balance of \$815.17 in all accounts. The Red Chip value begins March at \$62.50. Membership stands at 70; attendance at at February New User Meeting was 20 with 2 visitors and at the General Meeting, 18. Publicity Chair Russell noted materials were distributed to the usual recipients.

The annual audit of the books was successfully completed on February 27th and a report furnished to the Board. The outgoing and incoming Treasurer are coordinating the transfer of records.

The Board confirmed the slate of candidates to be presented for annual elections scheduled for March 8.

Among the topics discussed were the status of the Apple Ambassador account and the update of profile information following elections, the research status about APCUG membership benefits, and the responsibilities for the new Club Historian position. A proposed format for the Standing Rules/ Committees and Appointees was distributed for consideration at a future meeting.

The Board authorized the transfer of bank account access from outgoing to incoming Treasurer and Secretary after the election has been completed, appointed Brynestad and Moffat as the Standing Rules Committee, and directed Moffat to prepare a formal payment agreement to reimburse Beels for the purchase of the new projector. The purchase of iLife 09 and iWork 09 was discussed but action was deferred.

The Green Hornet, Scrooge McDuck, Robin Hood, Tom Mix, Mark Twain, Robert Louis Stevenson, Charles Dickens, Robert Heinlein, Zane Grey, Laura Ingalls Wilder, L. Frank Baum, Isaac Azimov, Arthur C. Clarke, Margaret Mitchell, Agatha Christie, Erle Stanley Gardner—to list just a few of the influences that built my reference files for how people dealt with problems, how communities handled issues, how events shape—or are shaped by—history.

So was I surprised when Univac's card sorters were used to represent "computers" on television game shows? Was there any doubt that Sputnik and Explorer 1 were just the beginning of the Space Age? Did President Kennedy's 1961 plan to send men to the Moon seem beyond the realm of Human Endeavor?

No. Most of my generation, coming of age at mid-Twentieth Century, had already accepted that we would achieve all these things and more. And that we would keep on achieving and astonishing ourselves as far into the future as the mind could glimpse.

For those who were of the Greatest Generation, the sacrifices and hardships endured through the Depression and World War II exploring and securing a brighter future were priorities. Sure, there were some who yearned for the good old days (must have been some time in the 1920s?) There were those who despaired at all the money spent "in Space" when not one cent was paid to an alien on some other planet—it all was spent right here on Earth creating jobs, hardware, and our future.

For many reasons, the enthusiasm and appetite for ambitious endeavors seems to have cooled considerably over the past 40 years. Inventiveness and achievement has not dwindled, it merely has been channeled into a variety of technological wonders that may not be as spectacular as watching a man walk on the Moon. Indeed, much of the electronic revolution on Earth today flows from the investment in the Space Race in the 1960s.

The investment back then was not merely brick and mortar plants to build missiles, satellites, or Lunar modules. America, her allies, and her adversaries invested in education. They invested in students. Faculty. Research and Development labs. Think tanks. The most important investment was people.

There was investment in people to assure that opportunity was fairly offered to all, to see to it that work places were safe, to value work performed and provide fair compensation. To be sure, many of these efforts are never-ending quests for improvement. Lately, it appears, some of these elements in our past success have been allowed to languish, to wither, and to disintegrate. Tough economic times may have revealed deficits that are more than just balance sheet figures: stakeholders are not necessarily stockholders. Inattention or intent will unbalance the ledgers of loyalty, the columns of common interests, or the accounts of fair treatment.

Much of what folks of 1960 wanted to believe would happen in the future has come to pass or surpass their aspirations. Some developments are as astonishingly better as others are unpredictably worse. As we ponder how to work our way out of today's sticky situations, I have to wonder how the generation coming of age today has furnished their Theater of the Mind. Are the props and plots constructed from the rich variety of aural and visual experiences like I was exposed to? Do they admire the same positive traits in their heroes that we did? Do they envision a world as changed in 50 years as we did?

And then there are those grumpy old gray geezers in positions of power that keep telling us to stop trying. We cannot afford it. We cannot achieve it. It's not our business. We're not qualified. We're too small to succeed or others are too big to fail. We have no right to expect.

Maybe they need to take a walk down the Yellow Brick Road. If they're lucky, the wizard will give them an imagination transplant.

Tom's Tips

New User Review Managing your Desktop

(As presented at the March 5^{th} meeting)

We discussed three features that let you control how your manage your desktop at the March 5th New User Group: Exposé, Spaces, and Dashboard.

From the System Preferences choose the Exposé & Spaces pane to look at your options. Here you can set the hot corners and F-Keys that trigger Exposé actions, that show/hide Dashboard, and that create the number of "extra" desktop work spaces, if you choose to enable them. If you are using some multibutton mouse models, you may also find settings for Exposé in the Keyboard & Mouse Preference pane.

Why bother with Exposé? This feature allows you to move open windows on your desktop in ways that make it possible to see all windows open and choose the one you want to bring to the front OR see all the windows open in the same application so you can decide which one you want to bring to the front OR move all the open windows out of view so you can get access to your desktop.

What's the big deal with Spaces? Here is a way to keep all the open windows associated with one project (or one application, or one member of the household) assembled together while allowing you to move to another "clean" desktop to open other projects-for example, to deal with Internet or Mail. You may choose to set a particular application to always open in an assigned Space; perhaps your Mail will always move to Space Number 3, so that any other projects you have open in Space 1 or Space 2 are not showing in the background while you deal with email. There are key combinations as well as menus and dock icons that permit you to move quickly between the Spaces you have set up. If you wish, you can drag individual windows from one Space to another.

So why use Dashboard widgets? Well, they are very small applications that make info available to you at the click of an icon on the dock or F12. You add or remove them easily when the Dashboard window overlays the desktop by clicking on the "+"

Converting AppleWorks Documents Macworld

Mac 911 Tip of the Week

Reader E.S., like many longtime Mac users, has documents in an older format that he'd like to use with newer applications. He writes: "I have several thousand AppleWorks files that I want to transfer to use on my new iMac. Not being a true techie, what is the easiest way to transfer my AppleWorks files to .rtf files for easy use with Pages?"

E.S., I'd like to use your question to teach a broader concept. And that concept is this: When seeking solutions for opening Document X, with Application Y, it's always a good idea to Right (Control) click on Document X, choose Open With from the contextual menu, and take a gander at what appears in the submenu. It's possible (though not assured) that one of the applications that appears there will open your document.

In your case, when you Right-click on a word processing file created with AppleWorks (a document that ends with the .cwk extension) you'll see that Pages is one of the options. Choose Pages and, sure enough, that application launches and converts your AppleWorks document to a .rtf file, complete with the document's original formatting. Similarly, AppleWorks' spreadsheet documents can be opened with iWork's Numbers application.

AppleWorks' database files are the most deadend-ish of the lot in that there's no application that will directly open them and maintain their fields. Instead, you have to save these files as ASCII text, at which point you can import them into Excel or Numbers where, possibly, you'll need to create column headings for the data. You can also import this data into Filemaker, but you'll have to recreate the layout.

at the bottom of the desktop. To find the huge selection go to Apple's website, Downloads section. We demonstrated widgets for current weather and time at various locations around the world.

Now here's a bonus: if you see some section of a website you would like to always be able to check quickly, in Safari you have the option (under the File menu, "Open in Dashboard...") of selecting an element from web page that will appear on your Dashboard every time you open it. Remember you will need to be connected to the Internet for most widgets to work properly once they are installed on your Mac.

We explored these three different ways to expand your desktop's versatility. Remember that using the F-keys on many laptops and some other recent keyboards require you to add the "Fn" key to the combination. Each of these features offer you some more ways to customize your Mac. Experiment! Explore! Exposé!
