New User Review - Apple's Safari

The May New User Group explored Safari, the browser that is part of OS X, reviewing some basic features of Safari 3, the current version, including options on changing the appearance, resizing display fonts, controlling how to show/hide the tool bars, and setting preferences for home page and download folder.

We demonstrated ways to save web pages as archive files and to create text clippings or hyperlinks by dragging selections to the desktop. We created a dashboard widget from a live element of a web page. And we compared Safari to Firefox to see the similarities in the two browsers' interfaces.

Stewart Beels showed the features of Safari 4, which is a public beta version of the next generation,

in a side-by-side dueling projectors comparison with Safari 3. Two of the most visible changes include the relocation of tabs to the top of the window and a thumbnail view of most frequently visited web pages which extends the usefulness of Bookmarks. If history is any guide, Safari 4 will ship with the next version of the OS X, 10.6 Snow Leopard some time later this year.

During the question and answer session Erick Camp addressed several questions about Internet security risks and safe surfing practices for Mac users. This meeting completed our two-session program covering Internet communications using Mail and Safari.

kept the citizens of West Berlin supplied with enough food, fuel, supplies, and hope to survive the Blockade. The airplanes flew more than 92 million miles--nearly the distance between the Earth and Sun--when the mission ended after 15 months.

The fallout from this summer's events may not be recognized for years. Will there come a day when "Hummer" refers only to a singer who forgets the words? Will the refurbished Hubble Telescope finally snap a picture of Willis waving to us from the canals of Mars?

Mt. St. Helens fallout in 1980 dumped abrasive ash downwind that was unkind to mechanical devices, unhealthy for respiratory systems, but beneficial to crops that grew lush from the rich nutrients that blanketed the fields beneath the ash cloud.

Alaska and Hawaii embraced Statehood with enthusiasm and optimism. Moving from territorial administration required the citizens to reconstruct the institutions that served their new statehood. Fifty years have been filled with changes in both states and placed both at the leading edge of environmental and economic development attention.

Russia's Berlin 1948 Blockade also had unintended consequences. It became an embarrassing challenge that thwarted her intent to chase the Allies from Berlin and take over Germany because--somehow-the city was supplied successfully by air. For the Germans, surrounded by the ruins of World War II,

the Berlin Airlift confirmed the Allies' commitment to rebuilding their country: their view of the Allied occupation forces underwent a change for the better. For the Allies, the Airlift was one more confirmation of the need for an alliance, which became NATO.

In years to come Russia would build a wall to control movement between East and West. In another June, a dozen years after the Airlift, "Ich ben ein Berliner" signaled that the spirit of the Airlift was enduring. Eventually, forty years after the Blockade failed, so did the wall.

Will 2009 bring watershed moments? Of course! At every level: from the June weddings and graduations which will mark personal and family milestones to the decisions in board rooms and capitals around the world. Perhaps we'll note the unintended consequences years from now.

Look around. Is someone you know because of today's economics about to choose a different career (which may well result in them winning a Nobel Prize--or an Oscar, or the absolutely perfect partner--instead of plodding along until they retire from the job they always thought they wanted.)

Along with rising smoke from burgers charring on patio grills let us celebrate the rising spirits which June traditionally has lofted. 'Tis the season for changes big and little. We'll deal with the consequences later.

Tom's Tips By Tom Garcia

There is a Mac program called VueScan that will act as a driver for whatever scanner you might have and it covers lots of them. According to the web site it supports more than 1,200 different scanners for Mac, Windows, Linux. I have a Canon LiDE30 scanner which has served me well over the past 6 or more years. It is light and best of all - requires no external power. Just plug the USB cable into your computer and go to work. Problem: (Don't I always have problems?) The supplied Mac software on CD loads on my Mini but has never worked. So, I have always used the scanner with my PC. But, the software on the CD wouldn't load on my new Vista PC and the Canon site says "Vista is not supported with this scanner." Enter VueScan. Downloaded it and installed it on the PC. Worked great except there were gray \$ signs all over the print out. Well, I had a trial version. \$40 for the full version of VueScan is less money than buying a new scanner and I might not find a scanner that I liked as much as the old Canon. Bought the upgrade and it is working fine with no more \$ signs. I am inclined to think that the Mac and Linux versions would work just as well. I'll keep using it with the PC simply because there is a table for the scanner on the PC side of my computer desk and no room on the Mac side.

Things I hate about Windows Vista #74: I don't know if this happened when I first used Vista or after I reinstalled it (within 5 days) because of so many Trojans & viruses. Windows took over one of my external drives and made it a drive of its own with lots of directories and files. I guess I could look at a Vista Manual at the bookstore and find out what that's all about. Bothersome thing is that three years worth of my backups were wiped out from the drive. Multiple backup drives are a good thing! The 2 month old Dell Vista machine died completely. Staples will have to fix it or give me a new one.

A new manual for me via Amazon: David Pogue's Mac OS X Leopard "The Missing Manual." Not one you would want to curl up in bed with because it's 894 pages. Pogue says he wrote it on a MacBook laptop with Microsoft Word. Maybe now I'll be able to figure out what Spaces (or is it Stacks?) is supposed

to do. His publisher (O'Reilly) thinks Pogue's Snow Leopard manual will be out in July.

Found something fun to play with on my Mac. A Color Computer emulator. I'm back to writing Basic programs just for fun. Years ago I wrote for Computer Shopper, Hot Coco (a Wayne Green mag) Color Computer News and Color Computer Magazine. Both hardware and software articles. So, the Color Computer from Tandy is right up my alley.

Move to Trash

Have You Tried 'Em?

Quick Look

To view the content of a selected item without launching its application you can use Quick Look. That eyeball icon in the Finder window tool bar (or pressing the Space bar) will give you a chance to peek at the text or image. For details check out Mac Help (Finder menu Help > Mac Help > Index > Quick Look.)



Keyboard Viewer

How can you see an interactive view of your keyboard on your monitor. (Hint: System Preferences International.) Find out how to produce a special character like a tilde n (ñ) or a copyright symbol (©). For more information about setting up and using Keyboard Viewer look in the Mac Help Index for Keyboard Viewer. (From Finder menu bar > Help > Mac Help > Index > Keyboard Viewer.)



Display Brightness

Adjust the display brightness if your Mac has a built-in display (such as an iMac, MacBook, or MacBook Pro) through the System Preferences > Displays or by using the F-keys designated on your machine. For details check out Finder menu Help > Index > displays > Adjusting your display's brightness.



Make a Folder

The folder is a basic organizer on your Mac. It collects files (or other folders) so you can keep items together in ways that work for you. Click in the space where you want to create a new folder -- in an existing window, in an existing folder, on the desktop -- and from Finder menu > File > New Folder. An untitled empty folder appears ready for you to type a name. (See Finder menu > Help > Mac Help > Folders for a bunch of clues on creating and organizing folders.)
