NorthWest Apple Pickers will begin another annual tour of the Mac Operating System this month. This year we begin to explore Snow Leopard 10.6, which was introduced last Fall. Snow Leopard included some major under-the-hood code revisions to run more efficiently on modern Macs but included relatively modest changes to the User Interface. We invite questions and support folks using other versions of OSX with tips about the differences in earlier versions.

Macs are about letting the system get out of the way so you can use those fabulous software products to do work and get things accomplished--no matter which version of OSX you are using. We invite all members to join us as we review the ways to make the Mac system work most efficiently to get that task done.

Tom's Tips By Tom Garcia

December 2009

An App for iPhone called Free Memory shows the free runtime memory (not the same as storage memory) and lets you click to free more memory or has a setting to do it automatically when the app is opened. It will also tell battery time remaining in percentage. Oh-Oh. Just went to the WEB site which is recessionapps.com and found this: "Apple has demanded that we remove the feature to Free Memory from all our apps. We have decided to remove our existing Free Memory 1.5 and MemoryInfo 1.1 apps from sale. We have instead submitted Free Memory Lite and MemoryInfo Lite without the Free Memory feature." Read more at the WEB site.

My battery pack for iPhone is an iPower² xpalpower (see WEB site). Works fine except it only took one day for the little rubber cover to fall off the mini USB charging input port. No big deal.

All day long my iPhone battery condition indicator in the upper right corner of the screen shows that the phone is charging. That is because it is, via the external battery pack. At the end of the day the normal battery indicator lights up with internal battery info, either white or green depending on what app you are using. Now you are on internal power. The app mentioned above shows 100% all day 'till the external battery is depleted then you start getting a reading for the internal battery.

Give Evernote a try. It is free for a reasonable amount of storage space at the Evernote storage site. You do not have to move anything off of your computer if you don't want to. I put all my big note(s) collection into the Evernote app on my Macbook then synced to the Evernote WEB site. Now I can access the notes (addresses, URLs, memos, serials for downloaded and installed apps, etc.) from anywhere. Also loaded the app on my iPhone so I can access everything from there. Evernote has been around forever, I used it years ago on my PC-XT.

Google Docs is still going strong as an off-site storage location, too.

WOOT had an Acer Aspire One Netbook (refurb) on sale the end of October for \$230 plus the usual \$5 shipping. A comment (abbreviated) from Sentiax on the site said: "The battery life is basically as advertised. I'm in college and use mine to take notes all

day and on average get over 6 hours of battery life, and have even had it approach 7. I bought mine new online for \$300, so this is great deal for a refurb, assuming it works well. The keyboard is 94% form factor from what I remember when researching it. The keys are very easy to use and the keyboard takes little to no adjusting [too]. I've played 720P HD video on this no problem and can run 1080P videos as well." The netbook is for my wife who likes to do realtor stuff such as property research.

Scam alert: "Google is Set To Hire A Group Of Americans To Work From Home In The Next Few Days. Thousands Of Jobs Available, Anyone Can Apply." Just send \$2 for the "kit." Glowing testimonies such as - "Mikey says: Thanks for the info, just started this 3 weeks ago. I've gotten 2 checks for a total of \$1900, pretty cool. " If it sounds too good to be true it is! Check these things out at snopes.com before getting involved.

To right click on a MacBook put two fingers on the track pad and click the clicker bar. I don't know how to do it on the new models with no clicker bar.

I bought the Schreiben word processor at a 43% discount from MacUpdate Promo. I'm a sucker for any new (to me) word processor. While using the trial version and deciding about buying it I came across several things I couldn't figure out (or spend time sleuthing) so I went to "Provide Feedback" and sent mail telling what it was I couldn't do. Within 30 minutes I got the answers.

January 2010

Mac OS X Daily Version Tracker e-mail is handy when it lists an application that probably is a version that would be an update to the version I have installed. I open my application (seen on the Daily Tracker) and click on "Check for Updates" and get myself up to date.

Last month I mentioned having found a "good deal" on WOOT and ordering an Acer Aspire netbook for my wife. We waited 3 weeks for it to arrive (it was to have shipped in "5 business days") but it never came. Then we got an e-mail saying

"We see that you ordered a red Acer Aspire One 10.1 Netbook; likely you have noticed that we've had a delay in shipping this item out. We have been in contact with the manufacturer who was supposed to send us so many reds, but has instead sent us black models. At this point, we are not sure when or if we will get the reds in." I was offered a black model with 2 day FedEx shipping. As we only had two days left in Maine we cancelled the order. WOOT had another brand netbook on its daily offer page a month later. I didn't even consider it as it came with Windows Vista. Having had experience with Vista it was a deal breaker.

At the local Las Cruces Apple Computer Club the lady sitting next to me had an Apple laptop the likes of which I had never seen. It was smaller than mine, with a 12 inch screen. Many of you know I was seeing an iBook G4. That got me to thinking: It's about the size of a Windows netbook but its a Mac! The iBook G4 entered the laptop scene in October 2003 and was sold in several screen sizes and versions until it was discontinued in May 2006. There were four major varieties with many subvarieties depending on options selected by the buyer. With each version, depending on installed memory and processor speed (800MHz to 1.42 GHz), the benchmarks vary by almost 100% from lowest to highest. Supposedly the last three versions are still supported by Apple. I located and ordered a used iBook of the fourth variety with Tiger OS for about \$350.

The iBook mentioned above was ordered from Gainsaver, same place the lady got hers. They sold me an item they didn't have as I was told by e-mail a day later. A week after that the item was still on their WEB site so I ordered again. Once again, they didn't actually have it. So, I gave up. Check the reviews on PriceGrabber. They are either "Great" or "Very Bad" as per reported experiences. My wife ended up getting an Eee Netbook with Windows XP which she is very happy with. It has a 10 hour battery.

The original Core Solo processor models (early Mac Minis and original MacBook Pros) will install Snow Leopard and run fine but only be able to use 32 bit software.
