## **Word Wrap**

For denizens of the Valley, September always marks a major milestone: The Fair. Today's seventeen day extravaganza transforms life around here for most of the month. In the olden days, ahem, before they added an extra week to the run, our experience of the event was still an amazing one.

In the mid-century version of The Fair access by road was constricted. The only multilane road into Puyallup was the River Road; all others were two-lanes. On a "good" weekend traffic jams extended for miles along Pioneer, Meridian, East Main, and Valley Avenue. Fair-operated parking lots were not as extensive in those days, either, so many more entrepreneurial home owners turned their front yards into a carpark. Streets throughout the city were lined with cars parked by folks who (then, as now) chose not to pay for parking.

Schools throughout the county dismissed for a Fair Day with free passes given to the students. Since this happened a week or two after the beginning of school year, The Fair was a great break from those stuffy classrooms.

Although the fairway has added some new wrinkles and there are more rides available these days, today's fairgoer probably would find the experience has not changed greatly. Many other parts would be familiar, too. Hobby Hall, vendor displays, Grange exhibits, 4-H, animals, vegetables, minerals, photos, arts, crafts, musical instruments, fur salons, vacuum cleaners, slicers, dicers, juicers, and huge stuffed toys, as well as doodads and gimcracks galore are still to be found.

Automobile dealer displays are no longer inside features: in those days new models were introduced just about the time the Fair opened, so it was a chance to check out the latest editions from Hudson, Studebaker, Packard, DeSoto, Plymouth, Pontiac, Mercury, Oldsmobile, Nash, Willys, Kaiser, Frazer, and maybe even an import or two like Hillman Minx, or Lloydmobile.

The Grandstand shows in those days were quite different. A dirt track was used to run half a dozen horse races during each show. Several rodeo events were run in the infield section.

And three stages presented variety show acts that often included performers featured on the Ed Sullivan show. High-wire acts, cute animals (remember Louie, the Wonder Dog), magic, trick cyclists, and other sorta-circus features outnumbered the musical or comedy acts. The finale always included a spectacular fireworks show that ended with the famous Niagra Falls set piece. If you were really lucky there was a harvest moon hanging over the scene.

Fair food has always been a prime part of the experience. From the huge grille of frying onions wafting their aroma to lure the hungry to the candy cotton and Fischer Scones, there is no shortage of caloric content. The variety has expanded over the years. The experience of sampling something new still remains for those who choose not to order the same old same old.

Those of us who live within a few blocks of the fairgrounds have noticed positive changes compared to the Fifties and Sixties even though daily attendance is grown considerably. Fair traffic from all directions is routed directly and quickly these days with no gridlocked city streets. Residential streets up a a mile from the fairgrounds are lined with parked cars only on the weekends instead of every day.

But when the wind is just right, we can still smell those frying onions and hear the screams from the roller coaster riders. Seems some things cannot be improved upon.

**From Puyallup** take River Road, take a left at the traffic light (the little bridge over the Puyallup River is on the right) onto 66th Avenue East, go to 52nd Street East & take a right, go approximately 3/4 miles. Turn into Chief Leschi Schools

**From Tacoma** take River Road & take a right at 66th Avenue East.

**I-5 Northbound** take exit 135, follow SR 167 toward Puyallup & follow direction from Tacoma.

**I-5 Southbound** take exit 135, take a left under I-5, continue past casino on SR 167 & follow directions from Tacoma

#### THE GRAND ENTRY CEREMONY

Going to a Native American pow wow is a way to see that culture perform one of its most sacred of events. Tribes come together and celebrate their heritage through dance and song at a pow wow, and it's also a chance for them to socialize with friends and family, sell their crafts and honor their creator. Part of the pow wow involves flags, including the American Flag, and certain etiquette applies.

#### **BLESSING**

Before the ceremony of the pow wow can commence, the Dance Arbor must be blessed. The Dance Arbor is where the dancers perform. After the Dance Arbor is blessed, no one is allowed to set foot on it except for the people performing ceremonial dances.

#### **GRAND ENTRY**

The pow wow's master of ceremonies announces the Grand Entry. This is one of the only times that spectators stand during the pow wow, and men must remove their hats. The procession of flags and then dancers follow directly behind the Native American Eagle Staffs. The Eagle Staffs and flags are generally carried by members of the military or active-duty soldiers. Because of the sacredness of this part of the ceremony, most pow wow organizers do not allow it to be photographed.

#### **FLAG SONG**

After the flags are presented, the Flag Song is performed. This song is the Native Americans' way to honor the native, state and American flags. Spectators remain standing during the Flag Song and the invocation, which is presented by a respected member of the community.

#### **END OF CEREMONY**

Afterward, it is safe to sit while enjoying the dancers and the ceremony. It is the duty of the master of ceremonies to guide the dancers and drummers while explaining to spectators the significance of each performance. When the pow wow nears its conclusion, he will ask everyone to stand again, and hats must be removed again. The Eagle Staffs and flags exit after the veterans' songs and closing songs.

#### RESPECT AND ENJOYMENT

The pow wow's flag ceremony is held in the highest regard, and showing respect during the pow wow is a strong part of pow wow etiquette. As important as showing respect and etiquette are, though, pow wows are to be enjoyed as a time of celebration.

#### THE FLAGS

The flag on the front page was carried in the 2009 Puyallup Tribe Pow Wow. The flags below were carried during a Pow Wow in Stockton CA.

This American flag like the other flags carried in the ceremonies is a flag of respect not disrespect.

This is the tribes' way of saying "we are part of America – it is our land too."


## Remembering Jan Chamberland
