A new Apple software company is called "GoBlue Software".

I have tried the free <u>Shade</u> which "hides your messy desktop." There is an icon in the menu bar that hides all desktop icons leaving just your desktop wallpaper. So, now I (mostly) just have my color photo of MS Mount Washington on Lake Winipasawki.

A few days after starting to use Shade (don't know yet if there is a connection) my MacBook developed this problem: Mail is white text on black background. Pictures are all displayed as negatives. Played with everything in preferences and was stuck. Anyone got any ideas? (I asked this of the mailing list.)

I was starting to think about reinstalling the OS to get rid of the inverted colors. As I once told my wife, "There is always a way to fix computer problems. It's just finding out how." Story: Years ago I bought my first add-on internal PC optical drive, "Twice as fast as other drives" said the Sony advertisement. (Blazing 2x speed). The supplied instructions were totally wrong. Trial and error finally got the driver installed and the drive working properly but only after several days of experimentation. I wrote a set of corrected instructions and sent them to Sony. Back to the current problem. A smart guy on the list told me just what to do. So simple. Press Control-Option-Command-8 and problem instantly goes away. Sunday Sept. 12th by Bob Moffat

President Camp called the meeting to order at 1:25 p.m. at the Lakewood Library.

Other members present were: Fred Battié, Francette Beeler, Clive Berglund, Eldon Estep, Mary Fleck, Bob Moffat, and Peter Winderling.

Reports were accepted.

Business card design will be circulated via email by September 15th for board members review with plan to have printed copies available at October meetings.

The board approved the proposed sale of the original club projector if the buyer agrees.

Meeting venue was reviewed in light of the mix up in September 2^{nd} Pierce County Library reservation. Board agreed to watch the confirmation notices carefully to try to avoid miscues and to keep aware of alternative locations which may be worth considering.

Board members considered publication policies regarding sponsorships, paid advertising, and the scope of noncomputer related content in the newsletter.

The board agreed not to accept commercial advertising for the newsletter.

An expansion of the club website will offer members a place to post for sale/wanted items.

Inclusion of non-computer community content in the newsletter was not favored; the board would rather see an issue with fewer pages--if content is not available to the editor--rather than topics that are more appropriate in a community publication. [See Editor's note below]

The board formed a committee to prepare for Christmas Party gift purchases: Erick Camp, Eldon Estep, Francette Beeler, and Bob Moffat volunteered. The board again authorized up to \$200 be spent for items.

President Camp also noted it is time to begin encouraging members to run for office. An article for the newsletter will be prepared and the job descriptions for board positions will be reprinted in preparation for establishing a search committee to produce a slate for March elections.

Vice President Winderling discussed topics for October and November General meetings.

Meeting adjourned t 2:50 p.m.

Admittedly the Sept. issue deviated from a "strictly computer orientated" newsletter. It was the editorial staff's thought that the NWAP members might appreciate some local interest. Please note that the additional cost for color was paid for by a donation rather than NWAP.

New User Group Recap

Sept 2nd By Bob Moffat

Three important applications built into Mac OS X are Preview, TextEdit, and Font Book. We reviewed each of them at the September 2nd New User Meeting. Preview is the default program that opens graphics files, such as JPG, GIF, PNG, TIF, and PDF. It offers the chance to add your annotations to a file as well as save in a different file format. Font Book manages the (what else?) fonts installed on your computer and includes several ways to organize them and to print out samples of selected fonts. TextEdit is a basic, easy to use text editor (a word processor without bells and whistles) which can open and save in the most common file formats. For many (if not most) word processing tasks, it may have all the features you need and the ability to produce a file that is easily shared with others.

The October session will review Disk Utility and Keychain Access, a couple of useful applications for maintaining a healthy Mac.

Even a year later, most Mac users were moving to the newly released System 9.2 and still viewing OS X with reserve: 10.1 (Puma)arrived in September 2001.

New PowerMacs at this time were able to run either system. Our lime green iMac was dual booting: we split our New User Group into an hour for OS X and an hour for System 9. OS X continued to evolve and improve. It seemed more stable and talented and as more applications were available, it became the main focus of our annual training cycles.

From the first official OS 10.0 release in March 2001, OS X has been improved and expanded. New features, increased capacity, more versatility, and improved GUI have arrived with regularity. By September 2009 Snow Leopard (10.6) was running on Intel Macs.

In a little over a dozen years since he returned to Apple, Steve Jobs's team has produced some game-changing computer software and hardware. His company has entered several other high-tech areas of the consumer market as well with results that spill over into changing the industries that support them. A raft of products with names that begin with "i" are influencing software and hardware design around the world.

Many criticize the closed nature of Apple's system. If only they licensed the system, goes the argument, they could have much wider sales. Possibly. But what sort of product would the consumer find when the wrapping came off? Apple has controlled the hardware and the software that runs on it so that what is promised is what is delivered. For years the other brands of computers available range from very good to very ...cheap. Some of these machines can handle a robust version of Brand X operating system: some do not.

The same experience is playing out in smart phones. Each manufacturer's model is keyed to a version of an operating system--not necessarily the same version as another brand of phone that claims to use the same OS. That fragmentation of experience which computer users have lived with for years has come to the smartphone market.

Will it get sorted out eventually? To some degree, yes.

Or you can take a look at the game-changer which pretty much delivers what it promises. By the time the others find the mark, the target seems to have moved. Again.

Seasons switch. Some things don't change much over a decade or a quarter of a century. Except they change everything.

There is a strange Microsoft "cloud" version of MS Office linked to your FaceBook account. Find it at **www.docs.com**. You need a FaceBook account to get the program running. I was able to easily create several Word documents but could not save them with names. Upon re-entering the program they were both there but no way to tell which was which without opening them. Same with Excel docs.

From my Alma Mater: The UA began the **MacScholar** program last year in partnership with Apple, and the program has grown significantly. Last year, 500 MacBooks were awarded; this year, approximately 1,500 new UA students will receive one of three Apple products – an iPod Touch, an iPad or a MacBook Pro – as part of their scholarship package.

Want Windows 7 to look like the latest Apple OS? The Snow Transformation Pack will transform your entire user interface to Mac OS X Snow Leopard, including the Snow Leopard Welcome Screen, Visual Style, Icons, Wallpaper, Sounds, Dock and much more (so they say). The latest version is 1.0 released on August 2nd, 2010 I don't have my PC in Maine so can't try it out.

That \$40 inkjet printer may cost you \$80 in ink in a year or less, depending on how much use it gets from you and your family. Kid's homework, anyone? You might be able to get some useful guidance from **printer.com** online as to printer prices and how much you will spend on ink over the five year life of the printer. As most of my printing is black and white I come out very well cost wise with my laser printers. Especially when I buy my toner on line instead of at pricy local big box stores. As for paper: For the last several weeks I have been able to buy a ream of paper at Staples for one cent, after rebate. Rebate submissions don't even cost a stamp anymore via Staple's easy online rebate site.

Free stuff info found in Kiplinger's Magazine: Go to **mrfreestuff.com**. I didn't get anything for free in my brief (3 minute) visit. Found people's comments about the various offers more interesting than the actual offers.

Starbucks's Free WiFi. No more jumping thru hoops at Starbucks for WiFi. It is free and open now. Anyone for an 8 hour coffee break? Wonder if it works in the parking lot? A few days after I wrote this I discovered that I could log in via iPhone across the parking lot in my dentist's office.


Snagit Beta For The Mac

The following example shows how to create and select signatures for emails if you are using the mail program that comes with your computer.

This is in response to a request from my sister.

Below is how you select the signatures.




Click on the "signature" icon. You may have several accounts. Chose the account in which you wish the signature to appear. The "All Signatures" just displays all the signatures.

However, if you have multiple accounts, typically all the signatures are NOT available in all the accounts. That is unless you copy them to the other accounts.



Now here is where the "work" gets done. Basically just follow the numbers.

I used a variety of shapes, colors, line types & arrows to show some of what is available in "SNAGIT"
