classes gave light-hearted reviews of what their student days at PHS were like. Then began the Roll Call of the Classes, where alums from each of the years present stood and gave their class yell. The earliest classes represented were from the mid-1920s.

They were around when the Model T began to move America. They survived the Flu Epidemic of 1918. telephone switchboards to mobile picture-taking/texting/Internet-surfing wireless wonders. Man walked on the Moon. Mt. St. Helens erupted.

Each of the classes as the roll call progressed reflected the times in which they came of age. Some decades, such as the 'Thirties and 'Forties, were represented by fewer grads than others. The turnout increased with the classes of the 'Fifties and 'Sixties and continued to grow as the decades progressed. When the roll arrived at the most recent decade attendance dropped off: probably much more difficult for recent grads to get time off from work or school. And, probably not yet drawn by a powerful connection to their past.

That connection is what interests me. In this day and age we tend to think most communities have sprawled beyond coherence, that most inhabitants are merely in transit as they follow employment opportunities from place to place. And yet...here was the large gymnasium at Puyallup High School filled with folks for whom this school was part of their heritage (several of whom were a part of this community more than eighty years ago) and with students who today are still preparing for graduation. The building in which we met was not even constructed when I attended PHS. The main school has been replaced, rebuilt, repaired, and often renovated since those earliest grads were students. This assembly once was held in the auditorium: the alumni crowd today is much too large for that facility.

The current students saw some amusing reminders of what high school life was like fifty and twenty five years ago--fashion, hair styles, cars, and musichave changed. I hope they also observed bleachers filled with old fogies who appreciate the education they got at PHS. Old timers who appreciate it enough to wend their way to this assembly every year to show some solidarity with other classmates and to demonstrate to those still undergraduates that there is life beyond graduation.

Schools today do not always have support they once had from involved parents, from concerned neighbors, from dedicated voters, from potential employers, from legislators, from elected officials, and from students themselves.

Think about the power of community which draws former students back to affirm the solid foundation that school provided: the star by which they charted their course in life.

Think about the continuity of multiple generations of families who have attended the same school: the shared desire to encourage today's students to keep reaching for the stars.

Think about the connection between the earliest classes represented at this year's event and the undergrads still attending school: generations learn from each other in a constant exchange of ideas.

The alumni in that assembly used their education: they constructed buildings, saved lives, went to war, raised families, became educators, built machines, explored, investigated, managed, legislated, mediated, adventured, constructed, surveyed, developed, invented, painted, preserved, wrote, created, produced, employed, served, failed, succeeded, survived, learned....

They have adapted to the ever changing world.

They return each year to renew that connection, celebrate that community, and refresh the continuity that spans a century from generation to generation; from class to class; from person to person. From one era to the next.

It seems to me that 2011 arrived before 2010 even got unpacked. Or before we cleared the clutter left by 2009 and 2008. I believe those connections between the days and months are shorter than ever. Fortunately, some of those links that span the years are holding, whether they are stretched or shrunken.

Have a very Happy New Year. And do your part to maintain those connections.

# TOM RETIRES "TOM'S MAC NOTES"

Just one item this month. I am retiring from Tom's Mac Notes. Last month was to have been my last input but this item is too good to pass up.

Do you know about **pobox.com**? The service costs \$20 a year for their basic level of service. A "Throw away" e-mail address is what it is about. Actually, three addresses. I thought that the Service must be new as I got all three addresses I asked for. One was as simple as **tom@pobox.com**, You can get a free 30 day trial from pobox just by asking. Here is why the service can be valuable. If you give an address out to someone and it is misused you just delete it and replace it with something else. My three new pobox addresses all forward mail to **tom@garcia.net**, my usual day-to-day address.

Jake in Customer Service at pobox is very quick to reply to questions. I told him that I have been testing my pobox trial and was impressed. Also, I said, "You must not have been in business for very long as I got all three addresses I asked for." He replied: "I am very surprised that you managed to acquire **tom@pobox.com**. We have actually been in business since 1995, and have managed to grow every year since then. In regards to your question, if you delete an old Pobox alias [address], you can create a new one right away! Are you having trouble doing so? If you are, please let me know, and I will assist you.

Cheers, Jake Darminion, pobox Customer Service."

The help system and answers to common questions works well. Better than well, actually. It only took 24 hours before the spam started flying in. Plenty of it. When you have such an easy or common address (as I do) as "tom" and "george" I guess that is to be expected. pobox caught every instance of spam from such senders as Barrister George Dennis (Esq), etc. Spam is put into a folder well out of the way and can be reviewed at your leisure. No instance of shunting of a legitimate message has occurred yet.


