## New User Recap

Three browsers—Safari, Firefox, and Chrome—were the featured topics for the April 7th New User Group. We explored how the three were similar and some of the features that were unique to each one. Since these three browsers have recently been updated, we discussed some of the security measures that have been enhanced and looked at ways to tweak settings to improve personal online security, such as managing cookies and private browsing. We also looked at the way to find extensions and add ons expand the capacities of the browsers.

The Extra Feature of the meeting was a chance for members to examine the iPad. Two of the latest models and one of the first generation were available for folks to play with so they could see what some of the hype is all about.

The topic for May 5th will be email: using Apple's Mail app. We will also look at some of the common text handling features of Mac programs-- text editors and word processors-- and some of the shortcuts and tips that are built in to OS X.

There does not seem to be an app for the naivety of some users. The same folks who chose a particular product because of the features that amazed and amused are alarmed when they discover they have agreed to hold a product that pays attention to where it is located.

How many times have we marveled at stories of missing or injured persons located when their cellphone providers were able to pinpoint their location and send help? What use would a call to 911 be if you did not connect to the nearest dispatch center? How relieved we are to learn that The Authorities have traced the sender of a threatening email and brought the offender to justice?

Big Techie is watching you.

From the moment the Internet came into our lives (many years ago!) our every move online has been recorded. Your computer is identified and tracked as your email bounces around the web on its way to your correspondent's ISP.

# Opt To Read Newsletter Online

Remember when we were told tales of a “paperless world”? When visions of trees left standing encouraged us to think of ways to save paper?

You can do your part to save the trees (and club funds) by reading your Apple Pickin’s Newsletter on the website instead of waiting for the mail delivery.

Around the first of the following month, check online to read your newsletter. It may take a few weeks to cancel your postal copy.

Member options, such as whether to allow their photo to be used or whether to receive the paper newsletter, are part of their member account information. As such, the options are found on the “My Account” tab (visible AFTER the member has logged onto the nwap site.)

Notice the **edit** button at the bottom of the screen. Click on edit and the page looks like this.

At the bottom are the option control selectors (their usage is described on the page.) Notice that in the views show above for my account, the option to opt out of the newsletter is “yes”. Once the member has selected the options they wish to invoke, they must use the “**update**” button at the bottom to save the information. The changes will go into effect immediately (options that have been marked as “yes” also have their text color changed to red to be more visible). Since the options are under the member’s personal control, the member can move back and forth at will.

Note! The newsletter goes out on a household basis. So if two members of the household are listed as club members, both members must opt out before the newsletter will stop being mailed to that address.

## Show/Hide Toolbar in Finder Windows

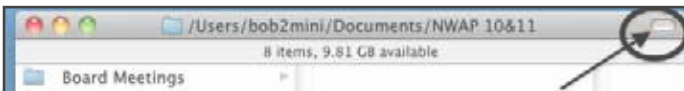

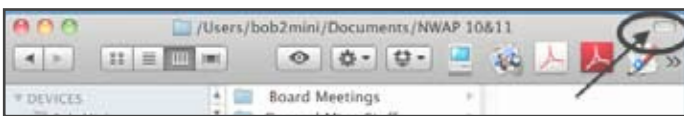
There are times when items disappear from the menu such as the search bar. I look at the preferences and it tells me that the search bar should be visible at the top of the page, but it is not.

I find this coming up more often recently, especially among Microsoft Word users. It is actually a simple problem that is easy to remedy.

At the very far right end of the Title Bar is a clear oblong button. Click on it and all of the tool bars will appear.



Apparently just about no one ever uses that button, and few know what it is for.



But it is there in every Mac OS X Finder window and in many applications, and it always does the same thing. It makes toolbars (and sidebars in the Finder too) disappear and reappear.

It is sort of an instant Classic-style Mac OS transformation. In addition to hiding toolbars and sidebars, if you use this button in the Finder, folders will now open to a new window and leave the old window open, just like in the Classic Mac OS's.

I don't know what Apple calls this button. I've heard users call it the "capsule" or the "pill." If someone clicks on it by mistake, it sure \*can\* be a pill!
