Genius Bar Experience

Some unusual things started happening with my MacBook Pro. All were intermittent but began to occur more frequently. It wouldn't start up from sleep mode after closing the lid, the menu bar wouldn't appear on start up until I clicked on the desktop and my regular login items sometimes wouldn't load. I went through the procedure to reinstall the operating system but couldn't select the hard drive because it was grayed out and had the message "This drive is locked" below it. I started a discussion in the Community Support section of the Apple website and one of the responders suggested I take the computer to the Genius Bar at an Apple retail store thinking there might be a hardware issue.

I decided to make an appointment at the Tacoma Genius Bar and it worked out well. I didn't know they could run some hardware tests in the store but they can and did with results showing no hardware issues. While there, they erased the hard drive and reinstalled the operating system. (After my assurance that I had a good backup at home.) I returned home and restored from a Time Machine backup. It's early but I haven't seen any of the problems I had been having and the system seems to be booting a little faster.

Try the Genius Bar if you have questions about the operation of your Apple products. My experience was positive dealing with knowledgable, efficient technicians who listened.

ness, laughter, tears, pride, embarrassment, achievement, and failure.

I looked at the moon the other night, remembering that moment in 1969 when we watched Neil Armstrong take that famous step. He represented the best of what humankind can achieve when they set a goal, gather a team, and dedicate their blood, sweat, tears, and treasure to that purpose. Today's global technological economy flows from the research and development that made the Moon landing possible.

A few weeks earlier we watched the latest Martian rover, Curiosity, survive an amazing landing maneuver to begin another analysis of the Red Planet. A truly amazing array of tools will allow this vehicle to delve into the history of Mars and add to the knowledge we have acquired from earlier rovers. By the way, Opportunity is STILL operating after its landing in 2004: the 90 day mission has extended for more than 8 years. They don't build 'em like that any more!

Curiosity's landing site was named after author Ray Bradbury whom we lost this summer. His *Martian Chronicles* and other science fiction tales inspired many of us to dream of things like walking on the Moon, traveling to Mars, or even building a space station in orbit around the Earth. And lest we forget, his *Fahrenheit 451* seems eerily applicable in these vicious days of polarized opinion.

Innovation was in the news recently. All sorts of tech movers and shakers have been trying to protect their patents (and other parts) from competitors. Look alike/work alike products have landed several manufactures in court. Several decisions have upheld claims of unfair or uncompensated copying of features and function. This issue is far from resolved. Pundits who "fear" that innovation is in jeopardy unless anyone is allowed to copy successful products seem to overlook the meaning of "innovation." This should encourage real inventiveness to solve the same challenge in a new way and give us all more choices.

Of course, Mac's latest OS, Mountain Lion, has arrived. Early reports have revealed no huge glitches or monumental changes to the way folks use their computers. Except: cloud computing has been integrated more than ever. Those of us that remember the original days of the computer age with dumb terminals and central processors the size of Volkswagens have an uneasy sense of

Are we so busy "communicating' these days we have forgotten how to cooperate, how to compromise, how to celebrate our diversity and unity, how to reach for the stars?



September is Search & Rescue time! We'll look at ways to organize your files, ways to search for files that you lost track of, and how to use Time Machine to back up (and retrieve) your data.

Recent New User Group topics have included a presentation in **May** by Andrea from the Pierce County Library on accessing e-pub and audio books online. She offered suggestions on how to use these resources on computers, mobile devices, and tablets. **June** is the half-way point in our annual tour, so we spent this midterm meeting following up on topics we have covered so far, as well as several we have yet to explore in detail. The topics for **July** covered digital images and how to use them in emails. We discussed size and resolution and choice of format (jpg, png, etc.) At the **August** NUG we explored word processing by looking at Pages, the iWork application. We showed how to use the Inspector palette to control the way text wraps around images and manage the finished document.
