shuffled across the surface of Mars sampling material and beaming pictures and data back to Earth. Their trials and tribulations helped planners prepare the current star of NASA's rovers, Curiosity, which is equipped with more advanced analytical tools. Opportunity landed on Mars in August 2012.

Exploration seems to be an important part of the way human beings look at their universe. How else does a child discover how to walk, talk, get into things, and learn how to survive? At some point the urge to find out why or how leads some of us to mount expeditions to parts unknown. Most successful explorers in the past spent time considering some of the possible challenges they might face and prepared accordingly. Whether it was Marco Polo headed toward China, Columbus embarking on a voyage to the Indies, or Charles Darwin boarding the Beagle, planning and preparation improved the chances for success.

The age of exploration has not ended with the satellite mapping of the Earth's surface or the arrival of man's surrogates on the plains and craters of Mars. At the highest levels of scientific investigation the micro and macro wonders of the universe are being pursued. Technology produces tools that give researchers new ways to find the hows and whys. As Mars reveals the possibilities of ancient seas and space observatories reveal galaxies to redefine "ancient," the CERN project may have detected some of the most elusive components of the universe predicted by quantum mechanics.

Few of us have the opportunity (or the calling) to lead a major exploration into the wilds of unknown territories, unchartered depths of the sea, or unconfirmed realms of scientific research. Most of us have our hands full navigating the aisles of the supermarket, figuring out how to decipher our utility bills, or finding where we saved that file on the computer.

But that basic human curiosity still prevails, even in us ancient Earthlings. We are still building our store of knowledge, day by day. Think about what you were doing back when rover Opportunity landed on Mars in 2004. Mac users were working with flat panel "iLamp" iMacs, G4 white plastic iBooks and new PowerBooks, the third generation iPods and


first iPod minis, and dealing with OS X 10.3 Panther. The iPhone was three years in the future and the iPads were seven years away. Cell phones in those days with cameras outsold stand-alone digital cameras. Apple had not yet released its first version of iWork (Pages and Keynote) so we were still using ClarisWorks! Photoshop v.8 (it's up to v.13 now) and Microsoft Office 98 (it's up to Office 2011 these days) were a couple of other common applications we used. Mac users had Safari to browse the web (or Opera...Firefox was released late in 2004.)

How have you adapted to changes over the last decade? By learning new ways to use tools, by mastering new tools, and by exploring ways to put new skills to work! Bet you are a lot more technically savvy than you were in 2004.

The rover Opportunity which is still equipped with exactly the same set of tools it had when it arrived on Mars. Fortunately we Earthlings have a whole new array of tools to use to meet all those new issues and opportunities that have shown up. Curiosity still leads us to explore. We may not be as adventuresome as Lewis and Clark or Drake. But we've probably seen more change in our lifetimes (or perhaps in the last decade) than some of the most famous explorers of earlier centuries.
