Bill Haley and the Comets were about to rock the music scene. Movie goers were trying to decide between Cinerama and Cinemascope (or maybe just plain old flat screen with cardboard 3-D glasses. Or we could stay home and watch the Jack Benny Show, "I Led Three Lives," or "Jukebox Jury." Network radio was still going strong, as well.

All was not calm in Congress in those days, either. On the political scene the Republicans had a majority in both houses: members that were serving included Richard M. Nixon (VP and President of the Senate), Robert Taft, Lyndon Johnson, as well as our Senators Magnuson and Jackson (who were not Republicans.)

The inauguration of Queen Elizabeth II in 1953 was an event televised in America (apparently film was flown across the Atlantic to assure the audience here saw it on the same day--this was before satellites, remember.) Isn't it interesting that Her Highness is still "in office" while all those governors who were moving and shaking in 1953 are long gone from power.

You think you know it all. But this OS is so robust that lots of details are easy to overlook. Here are seven little tricks that can make your experience using Mountain Lion even better.

#### **Secret 1: Share from TextEdit**

TextEdit is an extraordinarily handy application for creating text files. But you might have noticed that it lacks the nifty new Mountain Lion Share button. If you're like me, you appreciate this handy button on the toolbar that lets you send whatever you have open to Mail, Messages, your Twitter account, or other places, depending on what you're trying to share - (continued)

#### **Secret 2: Hide Notification Center for a Day**

The new Notification Center can alert you whenever you get new email, messages, tweets, or reminders—a very handy feature, unless you're in the middle of a task that requires your attention. If you don't want to see notifications - (continued).

#### **Secret 3: Use Punctuation with Dictation**

I'm dictating much of this tip using the new Dictation tool that Apple has added to Mountain Lion. It's easy to start Dictation by pressing your function key twice. Then just speak, and hit the Done button when you've said everything - (continued).

#### **Secret 4: Tweet from Notification Center**

Notification Center is on the right side of your desktop, always there with a list of your recent notifications when you click the Notification icon. But you can - (continued).

#### **Secret 5: Pin Your Notes to the Desktop**

Notes is a handy little app that lets you jot a quick note to yourself, but it also syncs beautifully between all your devices with iCloud. Notes also has a

## Fact or Fiction: Eight Mac Energy-Saving Techniques Tested

We're all interested in saving energy. Maybe you conserve to be a better global citizen or to save money on your utility bills. Maybe you use your laptop on the go and want to squeeze every possible minute of battery life out of it. But what if the daily computing practices you follow to save energy end up wasting it instead? What if your assumptions about Mac power usage are wrong? To investigate this possibility, Macworld's lab compiled a list of eight widely held opinions about energy conservation, grabbed our trusty power meters, and started logging power usage.

We used two systems: a 2011 21-inch iMac and a 2011 15-inch MacBook Pro. We connected them to a <u>Watt's Up Pro power meter</u> equipped with a USB connection that allowed us to capture energy usage logs while we ran various tests. Here's what we found out.

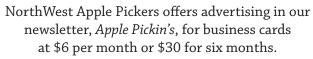
