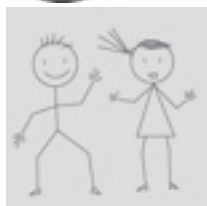

have the keys display at the top-right of your display so that you know when they're pressed.

5. Mouse with your number pad

Sometimes you might want to move the cursor to a very particular location before clicking. Or you may simply want to navigate your Mac from the keyboard without using a trackpad or mouse.

Click *Mouse & Trackpad* in the Accessibility System Preferences pane. Here you can turn on Mouse Keys, which lets you move your pointer by pressing keys on your keyboard. This technique works with the number pad on a full-size keyboard, or with the 7-8-9, U-I-O, and J-K-L keys. Move the mouse in any of eight directions, in tiny steps, by pressing the outside keys in that square, and click the mouse by pressing the 5 or I key.

Click the *Options* button to adjust some settings for this feature, such as the ability to turn it on by pressing the Option key five times. You might find this setup useful, for instance, if you're working on a detailed Photoshop file and need to select something with precision.

With these five system tweaks, you'll find new ways to work with your Mac. Try them out and see if they make your computing life easier.

members. And we are not discussing the weather report or our newspaper delivery.

I paid \$3.00 for my first subscription with money I received for Christmas and saved from allowances to become a happy 10 year old when Mechanix Illustrated began arriving each month. Over the sixty-some years since I've spent a lot more than \$3 a year on various subscriptions for real, three-dimensional weighty publications delivered to my home. The rotation of the Earth has been affected by the mass of all those tons of National Geographic, New York Times Sunday Editions, Life, Aviation Week, and Weekly Reader issues we all have buried in landfills (or stacked in attics.)

"Subscription" has other definitions and these days is becoming a term for computer resources you cannot buy. Instead, you have the opportunity to pay a monthly fee to use the software or service. Some companies are planning to stop producing real, three-dimensional discs in weighty tamper-proof plastic and cardboard packages. Without an Internet connection, consumers will have a real, weighty challenge to use these products.

Cloud computing is a rather hazy concept that covers several possibilities. At the simplest level it means Someone has a Big Computer Facility Somewhere on the Internet. For a fee, you can use that storage service, rather like a renting a public storage unit (for all your National Geographics.) Instead of a padlock, you open your Cloud storage account with a password via your computer. The Cloud service you purchase is designed to be relatively secure and has an advantage that it is located away from your computer(s) so a fire, flood, or collapsing attic will not cause you to lose the contents of your hard drive. (What if natural disaster dumps your data at the "Big Computer Facility Somewhere on the Internet" or BCFSOTI?)

Some Cloud services offer more than mere back up storage. There are some that synchronize all the devices you designate on your account. With the Apple iCloud set up, you can share documents, calendars, photos, and mail accounts so that your iPhone, iPad, and iMac all sing the same song.

Other Cloud computing set ups include new ways to use software. An application is running on the BCFSOTI so you sign in and produce word processing document, spread sheet, or other file by "remote control." The file can be saved in the cloud or on your own computer, but you may have to have an Internet connection to open it later. You may share such a file by sending the URL or link to someone else so they can go to the BCFSOTI to view it. And it may always be dependent upon that website/service to open and display the file.

Another model that companies are exploring combines some features of Cloud and Subscription. For a fee you can download to your computer software. It will frequently call home to verify that you have paid your monthly fee and to keep the software you are running up-to-date with maintenance fixes AND new features as they are ready for release. You no longer have to wait for a year or two to buy a new version with new features. As they are available, this subscription model will automatically be upgraded. Of course, if you decide to drop the subscription, the files you have created may sit on your hard drive like little lonely orphans (think AppleWorks files, for example) which you know are there but you cannot open unless you resubscribe.

Life in these times sometimes appears to exist only if you have an Internet connection. And a power outlet for your charger.

Things seemed so much simpler when you could **subscribe** to a theory or an informative periodical and you only worried about **the cloud** when might rain on the newspaper that missed the porch as was languishing in the middle of the lawn gathering moss and growing mushrooms.

Google Dashboard

Use Google Dashboard to Globally Edit Your Privacy Settings. Google has made it fairly easy to modify your Google account-related privacy settings across the Google enterprise by the creation of **Google Dashboard**. On the dashboard, you can modify what Google shares about you. With Google dashboard you can manage settings for services including: Gmail, Youtube, Picasa, AdSense, Google Voice, Google+, Friend Connect, Google Docs, and other services as well. Five Overlooked OS X System Tweaks

If you like to find new ways to tweak OS X, you sometimes need to look in unexpected places. For example, the Accessibility pane of System Preferences, which houses a number of features to help users who have limited seeing, hearing, and mobility, contains some nifty features that *all* users should know about. Here are five system tweaks that you might want to try on your Mac.

1. Change the cursor size

If you mirror your Mac's display to a large-screen TV or use a large (or especially high-resolution) monitor, you may find that the cursor on your screen is too small. You can change the size of the cursor, and make it anywhere from big to huge.

Go to *Apple Menu > System Preferences*, click *Accessibility*, and then click *Display*. Drag the Cursor Size slider from *Normal* (smallest) toward *Large*, settling on the size you want to use; the cursor changes size as you drag the slider.

This setting will change the standard mouse pointer, as well as other cursors (the text input cursor, for example), though it won't work in all applications. It will even make the hand pointer, which displays when you hover over a link in Safari, much larger.

2. Zoom everything, easily

Have you ever visited a webpage where the text is tiny, or wanted to get a closer look at an image? You can activate keyboard shortcuts to zoom the entire display, or you can use a scroll gesture—a two-finger vertical drag on a trackpad, or a turn of a scrollwheel—to zoom in when you press a modifier key, such as the Control key.

The May 2nd New User Group covered several features of Mountain Lion. We looked at Text-Edit and its basic set-up controls. We explored the differences in the various options to save files—Save, Duplicate, and Re-name—and showed how to browse versions that have been incrementally saved by the system as you work on a document.

We also demonstrated the new built-in Dictate feature that allows you to speak to your Mac to produce text in several different applications. Finally, we spent time looking at the features of Keynote (iWork's slide presentation app) to see how to use graphics, text, themes, and transitions in producing a show and how to export the finished show to a variety of formats.

The **June 6th New User Group** will be our mid-year review, giving members a chance to ask questions and follow up on topics we've discussed so far.

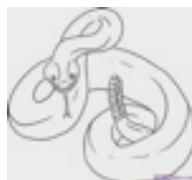

The demonstration included a look at how to assemble a file in iMovie that combines video, photos, and audio which can be edited to be displayed on the Internet or recorded on other media to share with friends, family, and clients. A video could be uploaded to You Tube or Facebook, for example.

The photos and video clips, along with titles, transitions between elements, music and sound effects, plus other features such as world maps that trace the route taken on a journey can be used to produce a minor masterpiece. Erick also showed some of the upscale editing power of Final Cut Pro and discussed several other applications that a serious videographer might use to produce high-end works.

Go to *Apple Menu > System Preferences*, click *Accessibility*, and then click *Zoom*. Select the *Smooth images* option, so that you don't see the pixels in images as they grow larger. You have a couple of Zoom Style choices: *Fullscreen* zooms everything on the display, whereas *Picture-in-picture* zooms the area around your cursor.

Click the *More Options* button to see additional settings, such as the exact magnification of the maximum and zooms, and how the screen image moves in relation to your pointer.

The Zoom preferences let you get a closer look at anything on your Mac's display.

4. Make modifier keys sticky

Set modifier keys to "sticky" and then have them display on screen so that you know they've been activated.

Do you find it hard to press Command-Option-Shift-W, the Safari keyboard shortcut to close all windows? Well, you're not the only one. Pressing more than one modifier key (the keys you use in shortcuts together with letters or numbers, namely Command, Option, Control, and Shift) can be tough for a lot of people.

Click *Keyboard* in the Accessibility System Preferences pane and select *Enable Sticky Keys*. If you activate this option, you can press the Command key once to activate it, and it stays "pressed" until you press it again. This arrangement makes it easy to press several modifier keys, as they will all add up. If you click the *Options* button, you can choose to
