and is introducing constantly. The pace of change is pretty amazing. New products and services seem to appear every day. The ever-expanding global information network invites more folks to share the experience, to seek the product, to desire the service, to expect the access.

When information traveled at the speed of sailing ships or horseback riders, decision makers may have had a bit more time to react, to frame a response, to weigh the alternatives. Our nation was born in those times. No smart phones. No Internet news. No Wikipedia. No Facebook. No satellite maps. No computers, digital cameras, or copiers. No Gallup polls.

The movers and shakers in those times had to be their own storehouse of knowledge. The decisions they made were just as difficult, no doubt, as those made by today's crop of deciders. The resources available in the Colonial times must have relied on publications and face-to-face consultations. There was no shortage of opinions and views. Settlers in the New World were a diverse lot. At times there was a lot of shaking and not much movement when they sat down to hammer out the details of the new nation.

Those patriots who persevered to produce the Declaration of Independence and work out the basic plan for creating a new nation were not omniscient. They did not foresee a world connected by instant communications and transcontinental air traffic. They had their hands full for the next seven years fighting the war of Independence. After the United States was recognized by Britain it took several more years and a couple of tries to get the Constitution adopted.

It was a long time from that July day in 1776 until the United State Constitution was ratified in 1788 and the Bill of Rights was adopted in 1791. In those days, just as in these days, it takes time to work things out. The Founding Fathers did not get it put together in one fell swoop.

If you think about the time span in more recent memory perhaps this would help: between our national birthday in 1776 and the adoption of the Bill of Rights in 1791 would have spanned the modern presidencies from Gerald Ford to George H.W. Bush.

The Apple II computer first was available in 1977, with the first Mac sold in 1984. The cellphone en-

tered commercial service in 1983. The Internet began in 1969 but didn't reach consumers until the World Wide Web commercialized in 1995. The span of those technologies reach from the Carter to the Clinton administrations.

The smartphone and tablets combined the computer and the mobile phone technology with the Internet. These devices already connect to health monitors, home security and other "smart" appliance managers, as well as provide cameras, global positioning services, barcode reading, and who knows what else. The devices are sold around the world. The applications available offer an astounding range of services from utterly inane to totally life-saving.

With all this information easily available you would think that folks who make those decisions would be sailing along making good choices and fixing problems like crazy. You'd think.

You wonder if today's movers and shakers are going through the same messy process our founders worked through ... while the rest of us get on with adapting to new economic, political, and cultural realities.

NWAP's Olde MBP On The Auction Block

NWAP MacBookPro for sale

The **2.2GHz 15.4**-inch MacBookPro which the club has used since the Fall of 2007 has been replaced. This machine arrived with 10.4 Tiger installed and an installation DVD for 10.5 Leopard (which had just been announced.) Through the years we continued to update it all the way through 10.9 Mavericks (although this machine lacks some of the hard ware that are needed for several recent OS X features and runs a bit warm with Marvericks.)

The model designation is **3,1** and the order number is **MA895LL/A** if you look for price comparisons online with other **Mid/Late 2007 MBP**s. It has 4 GB of RAM. We replaced the battery (now has about 40 loadcycles on it and a remaining capacity of 5295 mAh) and installed a larger hard drive (now has 320 GB.) This Mac has been gently used over its 80+ months, powered up for 4 meetings and several additional hours a month for program preparation. Some 3rd Party applications will be included.

NorthWest Apple Pickers members have the opportunity to bid on this machine by submitting a written bid to the Board at the New User Group (July 3rd) or the General Meeting (July 13th.)

the bathroom & found that the trap was completely bone dry allowing sewer gases to come up into the home. The second bathroom drain trap was also bone dry.

That's what happens when you turn the A/C up to 95°, the humidity is low & the water in the toilet bowl doesn't get replaced.

I have heard of pouring cooking oil in the bowl which I am guessing retards evaporation. A friend told me that it worked for them.

Only in Arizona can you get "hot" water out of the cold water faucet & cold water out of the hot water faucet.

The homes in the Phoenix area have concrete slab foundations with the plumbing in the slab. Also because hard freezes are rare the water supply lines are not buried very deep. As a result during the summer the ground & the slab heat up which heats up the water supply lines. So when you turn on the cold water tap you get warm water.

Not sure why you get cool water out of the hot tap. But to take a hot shower you have to run the hot water for several minutes. I know one guy who runs the "hot water" into 5 gallon buckets which he uses to water his plants.

We live in an Active Adult Retirement Community called Sun City West, Az which is over 11sq mi in size & has over 17,000 dwelling units. Even with all the people it's not uncommon to see an urban coyote meandering across the road & down thru peoples yards & that's during the day.

The other day when the wife went toward the front hose reel a mother Gambel's Quail started raising a fuss. The next thing you know 3 baby quail only a few days old come scooting out from under the hose reel container. There were 3 unhatched eggs laying right on the ground.

For being in an urban area we sure are in the wild.
