comet, then go into orbit and finally gently dispatch a lander (which bounced twice because of the minuscule gravitational forces involved.)

On the other end of the gravitational scale we have dire events here on Earth that seem to drag us into deep despair. From the Ebola epidemic to the conflicts shattering communities around the world, there seems to be no shortage of grim news. Some of us suspect there is an intense gravity well in the Washington D.C. area that has apparently immobilized thought, civility, hope, and action.

The season begins with Thanksgiving, a celebration of a bountiful harvest and survival–preparing for the winter months. Family and friends gather to remember. It's a time to honor those who have passed and to enjoy the warmth of those who are present.

Aside from the shopping frenzy which seems to become more intense every year (and I'm only judging on the past six decades or so, mind you!) navigating December is a challenge in other ways, as well. Sometimes it seems like the month is all about consumption: treasure, time, patience, calories—all reach stratospheric levels.



From the complexity of a space mission landing on a speeding comet to the utter simplicity of sharing a smile, human beings are pretty amazing critters. It's a time to remember those positive attributes. It's a time to press for peace on Earth.


