than a century ago Sci-Fi has mixed science, speculative fiction, and swashbuckling adventure for readers. By giving a generation or two the room to imagine what it would be like, we gave them an incentive to try to make it so.

For fans of the genre during its heyday in the middle of the 20th Century, the most interesting stories were usually about people and characters dealing with very human-scale conflicts in alien settings. As modern technology progressed, the gee-whiz far-out contraptions of earlier works began to be less featured. As *science* allowed us to explore and explain phenomena and build ever more sophisticated *stuff* to test and observe, fictional science became less believable. Authors spent less time explaining *how* and more time exploring *why*.

As we visited the Moon and sampled its dust, the old green-cheese theories crumbled. When we confirmed the horrific atmosphere of Venus, the fears of bug-eyed Venusian monsters were firmly quashed. No canals on Mars. No decipherable messages from Alpha Centuri. Some of the adventuresome aspects of Sci-Fi have been definitely dulled.

Star Trek in the late 60s was a treat for fans. Many of the episodes were adapted from familiar Sci-Fi authors. The staff on the bridge was a great mix of personalities and an amazing number of them apparently were required to operate the many amazing 23rd Century devices they needed to manage.

A decade later the Star Wars trilogy took us to a new level. There were just a few incredible technological items; the power of the story focused our attention on the human-scale conflicts that seemed to mirror familiar Earthly scenarios.

When Star Trek was produced, the chip that made the Apollo Moon landing possible was under development. Computers that existed in that era were massive: they needed tons of transistors (or vacuum tubes) and lots of power and cooling. They were vital to the planning, building, launching, and management of Apollo and most industrial progress.

Even when Star Wars was released in 1977, the integrated circuits developed during the Apollo era were just beginning a revolutionary bid to turn our everyday world into something that no Sci-Fi author had envisioned. Jobs and Wozniak and a bunch of

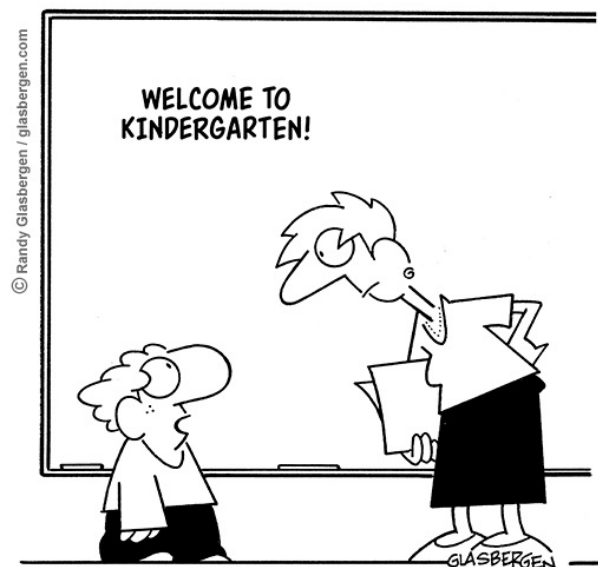
other youngsters were unleashing the personal computer on an unsuspecting world. Mainframe computer makers and users had no idea what was about to happen. Every industry was facing a technological tsunami.

Less than a decade later the Internet and the World Wide Web had begun to connect individuals and information in ways never envisioned in classic science fiction tales.

Today a person carrying a smart phone (code word for iPhone) has access to more information than any single individual would have had in 1995—or than any repository of data would have had at hand anytime in history. With a few swipes, taps, and pinches, resources from around the world can deliver the requested answer to nearly any conceivable inquiry. And while thinking about what questions to ask, the phone holder can be taking video or still photos, talking or texting over phone connections, checking emails, looking at maps, running specialized applications, or waving the device at a checkout stand to pay a bill.

Think of it! Captain Kirk and his cast of dozens could be replaced by Dame Maggie Smith giving instructions to Siri to run the U.S.S. Enterprise while she checks her Facebook page.

Imagination is an amazing tool. May The Force be with us, not agin us!
