Cons

- 1 Can't run Windows and OS X concurrently
- 2 Very limited set of Windows versions supported.
- 3 Can't install Windows on external drives.

Requirements

- 1 OS X Leopard or later.
- 2 Windows ISO installer or DVD installer.
- 3 A USB flash drive for creating the Windows drivers.
- 4 Intel-based Mac.

Let's get this out of the way first: Apple's Boot Camp isn't a <u>virtualization system</u> that allows you to run Windows. The Mac's hardware, which is built from pretty much <u>standard PC components</u>, is perfectly capable of running Windows as is, provided you could gather together all of the needed Windows drivers for the Mac hardware.

Boot Camp is really just an app designed to assist you in making your Mac ready to accept a Windows <u>partition</u>, and then to allow you to download and install all of the necessary Windows drivers. That's the core feature of Boot Camp, although it's true that Boot Camp does all this with the usual Apple flair, and by doing so, makes installing Windows on a Mac quite easy. In fact, many people buy portable Mac models just to run Windows, the reason being that the hardware is incredibly reliable and stable, and may be the best platform for running Windows. Although we commonly speak of Boot Camp, the actual app that performs all of the work is <u>Boot</u>

Seattle-Tacoma Metropolitan area today has almost as many million folks as were in the entire United States at the time our Constitution was ratified, 227 years ago.

Life in those times may seem placid and calm from our perspective. It must have been every bit as daunting and unpredictable to citizens in those days as the life we face today.

Technology was advancing: the steam engine was just beginning to hint at the changes to industry and transportation. In an age of sailing ships and (alive)horse-powered travel information moved much more slowly. In France a semaphone "telegraph" system worked pretty well --except in fog or low visibility conditions. The electrical Morse code system would be invented about four decades into the 19th Century, about thirty years before a successful typewriter design was invented. And writing instruments were mainly quills...fountain pens were just beginning to be perfected.

If you are twenty years old today, the amount of cultural change in your lifetime is amazing. The Internet has connected you to the World. Other electronic manufacturing and software developments have changed the devices you look at (ask your parents about CRT monitors.)

Born in the 1980s? To the above add the revolution that the personal computer started. In the realms of telecommunication, business, education, desktop publishing, entertainment, and manufacturing your world has been transformed.

If your arrival on Earth was in the 1970s, your generation was the first one to arrive on Earth after Humankind had walked on the Moon. The euphoria of that high-tech achievement was tempered with the grim realities of a conflict in Viet Nam that shook our National self image. Watergate and a Presidential resignation preceded our Bi-Centennial celebration. Of course you also observed the arrival of microwave ovens, the cellphone, the first microprocessor, the Sony Walkman, and watched American autos shrink in the years following the OPEC oil crisis.

The 1960s: JFK and Camelot, the Civil Rights movement, The Beattles, the Moon Landing, The

Pill, Telstar trans-Atlantic satellite, TouchTone phones, the ATM, and Woodstock...'nuff said!

So that look at a few of the amazing changes our countrymen have experienced in the last half-century hints at the role technology has played in the *what* and *how* we do.

If it seems that we have an unchanging culture here in America, take a look at that list. For each generation the cultural environment they grow up with is different from the previous one. The values passed from one decade or generation to the next are filtered by those cultural changes—and have been since our colonial days.

In the earlier decades of the 20th Century (at some of which I was present) the same amazing transformations affected the National as well as the personal outlook. (World Wars, economic boom and depression, auto and airplane, talking movies, radio and television, and, and...)

Those intrepid pioneers who landed at Roanoke, the Pilgrims who anchored off Plymouth Rock, and millions of others who came to this country from elsewhere to escape poverty or persecution, to find opportunity and dignity during our long history had to adapt to the reality of the moment. You can bet that folks from the 1790s would be confused, amazed, and probably appalled at the America of 1890 or 2015.

But it works. However imperfectly we move forward, we do move forward...to a more perfect union, I am confident.

Happy Birthday, America. Keep confronting the wrongs, keep fixing the problems, keep reinventing yourself, keep celebrating what's right and just.

Text, Typing, and All That Jazz

Our New User Group is going to explore the various applications that we can use to create documents that contain t-e-x-t.

Some of us remember sitting in typing class (back in the 20th Century...way back!) doing endless exercises to strengthen our fingers and learn the keys. The keyboard layout we use today is very similar to those old mechanical manual typewriters. But nothing about the machines the keys connect to is like the old Royals, Underwoods, Remingtons, Olympias, or Smith-Coronas we used to use.

We now have the advantage of seeing all the words we need to print neatly shown on a monitor or screen (correctly spelled, neatly arranged, carefully proof-read) before we send the file to our amazing desktop printer.

We'll be discussing some of the neat tips and tricks you can use to make the stuff you send to the printer produce the end result you hoped for.

Some 30 years ago when the Mac introduced What-You-See-Is-What-You-Get (WYSIWYG) word processing (and printer technology to match) it changed the way text was created. Erasing shields, white-out fluids, carbon paper, and inked ribbons soon joined buggy whips in the museums of fond memories. Take a look at this view from one of the first Mac applications: can you figure out what the icons control?

<u>Camp Assistant</u>. The purpose of Boot Camp is to recognize Windows disks at boot time, so you can choose between the Mac OS and the Windows OS when you boot your Mac.

Using Boot Camp Assistant

Boot Camp Assistant allows you to download the current Windows support software from Apple to a USB flash drive. This software includes a selection of drivers that will allow you to use your Mac's keyboard, trackpad, built-in camera, and other Mac hardware with your copy of Windows. In addition to the hardware drivers, the support software includes an installer that runs under Windows to ensure all of the Mac hardware drivers are installed under Windows correctly.

The second major function of Boot Camp Assistant is to install or remove a supported version of Windows (more on which versions are supported later). The installation process starts with Boot Camp Assistant creating a Windows <u>volume</u>; you can choose to divide your startup drive into two volumes, one for your current OS X data, and the other for your new Windows installation. You can select the size of the new Windows volume, and the partitioning utility will resize your OS X volume to make room for Windows.
