Webb served on our Board and was one of the prime movers in rewriting our Bylaws a few years ago. He coached new users at our meetings, shared his knowledge of hardware and software, and joined us at the Mortvedt sessions. His health in recent years made those visits less frequent. Our meetings always were brighter when he was present.

Retired Army officer, sailor, pilot, powerboat squadron instructor, photographer—Webb was a renaissance man. He often adopted unwanted equipment that could be refurbished for use by folks who had no computers. He always had something simmering on the back burner and was actively contributing.

His service to the nation was a reflection of his attitude in serving in all the other groups and organizations that benefited from his presence.

***Rest in Peace, Webb.***

on these systems for three months there seem to be few glitches in the official releases.

By the time this issue of Apple Pickin's is published, many of us will have installed the iOS 10 on our iDevices and macOS Sierra on our computers. (Apparently we don't call the Mac operating systems "X 10.x" anymore.) We've spent some time at recent meetings discussing how to prepare for the upgrades. While some folks will be trailblazers for us, installing the new systems as soon as possible, others will be willing to wait a few days or weeks to see if any applications they rely on are fully compatible with the changes.

By all accounts, the new operating system versions will be mainly evolutionary. The iPhone/iPad and Mac systems cooperate with one another in more ways than ever. The newest hardware is the most versatile. While our older models can install this year's OS, there are features and functions that cannot work without the improved chips of newer equipment.

Do we have to continually update and upgrade our stuff? Of course we do...not.

In this digital age of security uncertainty, it is important to keep up to date with those security fixes that are issued for your system and for the applications you use. Ignore them at your risk.

Are the latest bells and whistles vital for your happiness, good health, and stunning good looks? Your mileage may vary.

Anyone who has used computers for a few years can tell you: updating software is not always a move in the right direction. Some companies have chosen to stop development or support of an application (this may be because the system changes are too challenging to fix or because they have a newer, "better" product to sell you.)

Many of us have the experience of discovering our important files from years past are no longer readable by any application that can run on our system. Every upgrade of the Mac or iOS may create this roadblock if that third party item you have used since GM was building Oldsmobiles does not keep up with the changes. Just as the connectors that hook up external drives or keyboards have changed, the code that favorite program uses may no longer run on today's system.

Check your "archives" before you make a leap into the future. If your favorite *old* files still work on your favorite *old* application you may be good to go. Still, it might be worthwhile preserving the file by creating a *PDF* or *save as...* in an alternate format that other applications can continue to open.

Our annual tour of the the current systems begins in January. We still have a couple of months before we officially begin looking at the latest iOS and macOS versions. We will spend some time this month looking at a few new features and dealing with questions about upgrading.


If you have a question (or an answer!) bring them to our meetings. We'll be interested to hear how you fared in the big move to the new and wonderful.

Perhaps life has not settled down in to any rut, after all. We need to get busy and figure out what in the world has changed and where in the world they hid the vital icon we rely on to surf the web. Fortunately, now we have something to do on all these rainy days.

# Operating System updates for iOS and macOS

## Now for something completely different

In case you were canoeing across the North Atlantic this summer and missed the news, Apple has released upgrades to the operations systems that run the Mac and the iDevices.

A pair of new iPhones (the 7 and the 7Plus), a new model of the , and various accessories have debuted, as well.

For those of us who are upgrading existing equipment, the iOS 10 system for iPhones and iPads was released on September 13<sup>th</sup>. The new macOS Sierra upgrade release date is September 20<sup>th</sup>.

If your Mac is running El Capitan it will be able to run Sierra (with one or two exceptions.) If you are running iOS 9 on your iDevice, it should step up to iOS 10.

Smart users back up. Especially before downloading a new system.

Probably a good idea to run basic maintenance tasks (virus scan, malware scan, permissions, disk utility check hard drive) and possibly even go through the junkiest folders and throw out that stuff you've been meaning to trash for awhile.

If you have any big computing projects underway, you might be better off finishing them before you set aside an hour or two to download, install, and set up a new system.

You may need to upgrade third party applications to be compatible. Pays to check that out, too.

Oh! And expect OS 10.11 and iOS 9 to have updates about the same time as their younger siblings are released.

Want some basic info about the new stuff? Go to Apple.com to see some facts. There are many other techie web sites that will inform, as well—Macworld.com, AppleInsider.com, Tidbits.com, and MacRumors.com—to name a few.

NWAP will explore the new systems in depth during 2017. However, this month we'll look at some of the new and amazing developments that we'll be trying out as soon as we can.
