We are so connected. And depend upon being connected. Does the restaurant have wi-fi? Is there decent cell-tower reception? How strong is the signal? Is the GPS showing my actual location?

How else will we *know* anything? Who is up and who is down in the polls? What's trending (whatever that means!) Hashtag this and Like that. Let's agree: the Internet has utterly changed the way we relate to our friends and family, to our neighbors and countrymen, and to the world wide community.

We are connected in ways we didn't realize. It turns out all those *things* that we're adding to our lives that rely on the Internet to improve our existence sort of function in a nearly invisible realm. Rather like the house elves in Harry Potter adventures, they stay out of our way, doing the simple tasks. Security cameras, baby monitors, smart thermostats, "intelligent" refrigerators, and dozens of other artificial dumbness devices whirl away in the background.

Turns out these very simple appliances can revolt against humanity just as the sci-fi authors wrote about because that clever light bulb and its silicone siblings are not very smart: they don't know who their masters are. They don't know you from Adam! You purchased them and set them up to serve you, but didn't have a chance to reset the default password they use to talk to the Internet.

You have a secure modem/router for your computer, iPhone, and iPad protected by a cleverly-chosen, frequently-changed password. The rest of your household elves, however, are linking to the world at large with whatever simple setting they received at the factory. They don't know they are working for you... they are just humming along talking to the party line and following the simple rules burned into the dollop of silicone that keeps them running.

The websites around the world make millions of connections between users in the blink of an eye. The computers at a major shopping site or an entertainment source are designed to support a huge number of incoming requests to visit. But even in our modern gee-whiz Internet era the system can be overwhelmed. That is what happened recently when the "hackers" instructed a bunch of those stupid lit-

tle "smart" devices to to join with a flood of computers to bring many servers to their knees.

Denial of Service. If you were trying to connect to best_deal_ever.com on that day, your browser may have stalled or reported that the server was not responding. Many parts of the Internet were slowed by way more traffic than usual. And you probably didn't notice a thing when you went to the fridge to get ice for your drink or checked the porch cam to see if the mail had been delivered. As you changed the color mood of your office lighting, the bulb probably didn't even flicker even though it was busy trying to see lampshades on Amazon.

For old time's sake let's review Azimov's laws of Robotics:

- A robot may not injure a human being or, through inaction, allow a human being to come to harm.
- 2 A robot must obey the orders given it by human beings except where such orders would conflict with the First Law.
- 3 A robot must protect its own existence as long as such protection does not conflict with the First or Second Laws

You might just remind the "smart" Internet of Things in your household who is the boss.
That's us. Right? Or is that Denial of Reality?

8. Location History on Facebook

Facebook's Nearby Friends tracking feature requires that you turn on "always active" Facebook location history recording, which means Facebook records everywhere you go and stores this information. Yeah, we think it's ultra creepy too and recommend not turning this feature on.

The 8 Worst Privacy Settings to Leave Turned On

Sometimes I look at a privacy setting and wonder who would ever allow that? Why would someone want to provide that much personal information to total strangers or to some large Internet company? App makers sometimes like to test the limits to see what they can get away with, before users decide to turn off a feature because they aren't comfortable with the amount of personal data being provided, or the audience that it's being shared with.

We've compiled a list of the top 8 privacy settings that make us scratch our heads and wonder why anyone would leave them turned on:

Here Are The Top 8 Worst Privacy Settings to Leave Enabled:

1. Geotagging pictures (Your Phone's Camera App)

Here's a bright idea: let's tag every picture we take on our phone with the precise GPS coordinates of where the photo was taken and embed the data in the picture. What could possibly go wrong? Lot's of things could go wrong. Stalkers could find out where you live by reading the metadata from a picture you posted online for one thing. continue reading below our video

How to Backup Everything

You should consider turning off this feature at the source (in your camera's app settings). If you have pictures that already have this data in them, Check out our article: **How to Remove Geotags From Your Pho**

2. Facebook's Nearby Friends Location Sharing "Until I Stop" Setting

You know what I really want to do? I want to tell my friends my exact location and then I want to lock the setting so that it allows for constant updates. Sounds like a great idea, right? Maybe not. If you don't find the prospect of letting your friends know where you are all the time then you may want to make sure your phone's <code>Facebook</code> App isn't allowing this type of thing. Click on the compass icon next to someone you've shared your location with in the <code>Nearby Friends</code> section of the app and make sure the "Until I Stop" option is not checked.

3. Access to Your Phone's Microphone

Some apps request access to your phone's internal microphone to perform certain tasks. We find this feature to be creepy. On the iPhone there is no subsetting to only allow access while the app is in use, so it's hard to know when the app is actually using the microphone, which is also a concern.

4. Photo Stream Syncing on All Devices

While you might not think of photo stream synching as a privacy issue, the first time you take a provocative selfie and it ends up synching to your Apple TV in the livingroom and shows up on the screensaver while Grandma had paused a movie, you'll realize that this feature has privacy implications. You may want to turn this feature off if you have a lot of devices that share the same iCloud account and could potentially end up in the wrong hands. Read our article: How to Secure Your Racy Photos for some tips on avoiding the situation described above.

5. iMessage's "Share Indefinitely" Location Sharing Setting

We find all location sharing app options to be creepy. Similar to Facebook, iMessages location sharing is even more scary because if someone got a hold of your unlocked phone they could set the "Share Indefinitely" option on the location sharing for their number and potentially be able to track you without your knowledge. To Check to see if you are sharing location information with anyone go to your Settings > Privacy > Location Services > Share My Location, then look to see if there is a list of people that you are sharing your location with.

6. Allow Public Anything on Facebook

The "Public" option on Facebook pretty much lets anyone in the world see whatever you have set to that audience. Use this option sparingly or not at all if you don't have to.

7. iMessage "Allow Read Receipts"

If you want people to know exactly when you read and ignored their text message then, by all means, leave this setting turned on. If not, turn it off in the **iMessage** app's settings


