serve if she didn't have to write the monthly column. That's how I got dragooned into writing this column.

The arrangement continued a year later when we all dragooned Peter Winderling into his first term as President. During that first Winderling Administration the Editor, Stewart Beels, re-engineered the newsletter to become the *Apple Pickin's*. Editors–from 1994's Chuck Newton and Susie Meador, to Larry Weakly, Stewart Beels, Bob Morgan, and David Putman–have provided a paper trail chronicling our organization's milestones and the evolution of the world of computing.

In 1994 (when I joined) our members were using Macs--Performas, Quadras, LCs, and a gaggle of models stretching back to the original Macs introduced the year NWAP was formed in 1985. Desktop publishing was an important skill (and income producer) for several members. There were a couple of good local retailers selling Macs and several others who had Macs on the shelves, but tried to sabotage sales by disabling the machines or hiding them in a dark corner.

The year which had just ended (1995) was filled with "interesting" events. The OJ Simpson trial, the first book sold by Amazon, the introduction of the DVD format, JAVA and PHP, the introduction of Windows 95, and the Oklahoma City Federal Office building blast. Prodigy offered access to the World Wide Web. The first Yahoo! and Altavista search interfaces appeared. Do you remember those techie names—AOL, CompuServe, GEnie, AppleLink, Usenet, ARPANET, and others. And how about all those golden years of dial-up local Bulletin Board Services or Mosaic, Netscape Navigator, and Internet Explorer browsers.

It was a terrific time to be an Apple fan! The company was flailing around. Introducing models like mad and updating the Operating Systems every six months. Apple faced a wide array of competing PC builders and operating systems in addition to Windows. The word "beleaguered" was beginning to appear in nearly every article written about Apple (with good reason.) The products still worked fine but software and hardware developers were becoming more interested in chasing the growing PC market.

Oh, and in 1995 one of the Oscar nominees was a computer animated film called *Toy Story*, from some outfit named Pixar owned by a guy named Steve Jobs. Who knew?

Some 400 words ago I was looking at that blinking cursor and thinking of all the events, all the tech developments, and all the cultural shifts that have occurred in a couple of decades. They pale in importance

compared to the people who have been part of this organization. The array of talented folks who have joined NWAP to learn, to share, to contribute has been phenomenal. What a privilege to have been a part of that process.

As we do every year, it is time to recruit folks to join the Board to guide us through another 12 months. Have you benefited from NWAP? Can you spare an extra hour or so a month to see that the club continues to meet its obligations and goals?

Gmail phishing scam-beware!

If you use Gmail, you should be aware of a new phishing scam that's fooling even some of the <u>most tech-savvy users</u>.

According to security expert Mark Maunder, the CEO of a WordPress security plugin called Wordfence, the hacker will first send you an email that includes an attachment. When you click on it, you're directed to what looks like a Gmail login page, according to Fox 59.


However, it's a fake. If you enter your email and password, you're giving your login credentials to hackers who then have complete access to your emails.

What is all that stuff in the Downloads Folder?

The Downloads Folder is a part of the Mac Operating System. Look for it on your Dock and on the Finder window sidebar (if you have chosen to display it there.)



You will also find it in your browser preferences (Safari, Firefox, Chrome) as the designated place to send items you have ... wait for it ... downloaded.


The *good* news is that unless you mess with success, everything you download will be found in that one folder. The bad news is that everything you have ever downloaded stays in that folder until you move it somewhere else.

Somewhere else could be the Trash (if you no longer need the item.) Somewhere else could be a folder elsewhere in the Documents Folder, on your Desktop, or perhaps inside a folder created to store useful downloaded material you intend to keep.

When you download an application update (such as Flash player, for example) it will place the installer file in Downloads. A few weeks later when an newer version is

downloaded it winds up in the same place. Guess what: unless you throw the older version(s) away, they will stay right there in the Downloads Folder. Forever and ever.

Attachments in Mail.app may be handled in several ways. Hover over the area just above the message to see options to SAVE the attachment (which opens a navigation window that allows you to choose the destination.) Right click or Control click on an item in the




includes Save to Downloads Folder choice. So now we know how all these things wound up in your Downloads. The challenge is to manage all these items. Instead of ignoring them and allowing them to accumulate for months (or years) make a habit of opening the folder once in a while. Look at what

is there. Do you need to see that photo again? Did you install that application? Is that PDF important enough to move to a file where you keep similar items? Can you just move most of the stuff to the Trash?
