The First Five Things You **Should Do With A New** Mac

Perhaps you're getting a new Mac over the holidays. Whether it's a sleek MacBook or MacBook Pro. an iMac. or perhaps a powerful new iMac Pro, we'd like to start off the relationship with your new Mac on the right foot. To do that, we suggest following our checklist of the first five things you should do with any new (or just new to you) Mac.

1) Follow Apple's Instructions for Initial Setup

Setting up a new Mac is simple that's the way Macs have been since the first one shipped back in 1984, and they're still a piece of cake to set up. Here's what you'll want to do:

Step 1 – Check for an Internet connection

Your Mac needs to be somewhere that has either a Wi-Fi network or another connection to the Internet, as it uses that connection to complete some of the setup steps. If the network requires a password — as it should — be sure to have the password ready.

Step 2 – Plug in only the essential devices

My first New Years as a NorthWest Apple Picker was in 1995, three months after I joined this exalted Macintosh User Group. That is twentythree (23!) years ago. We had about 70 members. The club's machine was a Quadra 610 which ran System 7.5 on a Motorola 68040 processor at 25 MHz. It handled 1.44 MB floppy disks and 2x CDs. tor to transmit a very hazy black and white image of the color monitor.

Our current MacBook Pro runs OS 10.13 on an i5 processor at 2.4 GHz. It has USB, Thunderbolt, HDMI, as well as bluetooth and Wi-Fi capabilities. Our color projector mirrors the Retina display. We now have more than 100 times the storage capacity of that Quadra --the comparison between 4 *MB* to 8 *GB* of memory requires advanced math.

In those days the World Wide Web was just about to take hold with the delivery of Mosaic, a "browser" that made the Internet user friendly. Local dial-up electronic Bulletin Boards numbered in the hundreds and were tailored to interests broad or narrow--a harbinger of the way websites would develop in years to come.

The difference between 1995 and 2018 is not about mechanical/electronic contrasts, however. The changes in the way we live and work in the past quarter of a century are amazing. Most folks had not touched a "computer" back then (except for an ATM, perhaps, or a pocket calculator.) Today most folks (and kids in school) take computers for granted as well as smart phones, tablets, and other mobile devices that have changed the way we connect to people and information.

When some event occurs, chances are there is a news crew on the way to upload video to the Internet within minutes. The event will be featured on Facebook or Twitter within a few heartbeats. We check online traffic reports and weather radar before leaving the house on a shopping trip. In fact, shopping from home via the Internet is changing retail business models...and adding new delivery services and security issues.

Security of our personal information has become more tenuous. Safety and privacy breaches have left us all feeling vulnerable, helpless, and incensed. Folks collecting information about us--without our consent or cooperation in most cases--have not been held accountable for keeping that data safe.

Compared to what we see today, 1995 seems a calmer, gentler time. TV's Frasier and Murphy Brown were entertaining us, Pixar's Toy Story was showing us what computer animation could create,

eBay and Amazon were being organized, and Windows 95 and Internet Explorer were about to arrive from Microsoft. Color inkjets prices were almost the same as mere black and white models had been a year earlier. The Toyota Tacoma pickup and the Chevvy Tahoe were introduced. There was a war in Bosnia to fix. There was a showdown brewing between a couple of branches of government in Washington D.C.

Time flies, doesn't it? Here we are looking forward to the next twelve months with no more ability to predict events than human beings have ever had. Will the economy boom or bust? Will world peace be preserved or crumble? Will the Next Big Thing bring positive changes to our lives?

About the only thing we can be certain of is that lots of stuff is about to happen that will amaze, amuse, astound, affront, and affect us. Someone in twenty years will be reflecting on 2018 with a similar sense of wonder: did anyone back then realize what a game-changing development \boldsymbol{X} was and how it would change the course of history?

May your 2018 be healthy, happy, prosperous, and positively memorable.

The First Five Things You Should Do With A New Mac

If your Mac has an external keyboard and trackpad or mouse, turn them on (if they're Bluetooth) or plug them into your Mac. When using an external display (for example, on a Mac Pro or Mac mini), plug it in and turn it on, but do not connect any other peripherals. Be sure to plug in your Mac, too! Step 3 – Turn on your Mac

Some MacBooks automatically turn on when you connect them to power or open the screen. On other Macs, press the power button to start up. On iMacs and Mac minis, the power button is on the back lower left side of the computer.

Some MacBooks have a power button on the upper right side of the keyboard. Most Macs acknowledge powering up with a startup tone, but the new MacBook Pros do not.

Step 4 – Follow the Setup Assistant

The Setup Assistant is a series of screens that your Mac displays as soon as it has booted. You'll be asked for setup details, like your location (country) and your Apple ID. If you've ever used iTunes or have an iPhone or iPad, you have an Apple ID and should use that Apple ID during setup. If not, you'll be given the opportunity to create one.

In addition, you'll be asked if you wish to turn on FileVault (which encrypts data on your internal drive), iCloud Keychain (which shares stored passwords and credit card information between devices), and Find My Mac. The latter is important if the Mac is ever stolen or lost, so definitely turn it on. Our recommendation is to let Setup Assistant turn on all of these vital security services.

Finally, you're asked to create the name and password of your computer account. That information is used to log into your Mac, change some settings, and install software.


Step 5 - Check for Software Updates

At this point, your new Mac is almost ready to go, with the desktop fully visible, the Finder menu bar at the top of the screen, and the Dock at the bottom. This is a good time to click the App Store icon in the Dock, click the Updates button at the top of the App Store window, and then check for software

updates. Install them, and then you've got one more easy thing to do...

Step 6 – Connect Printers and Other Peripherals

Remember how we made a point in step 2 to not connect any other peripherals? You can go ahead and do that now. Attach your external disk drives (see Step 4 – Set Up Backups, below), printers, microphones, speakers, USB hubs, and anything else you have acquired to make your Mac unique.

- 3) Set Up iCloud and Associated Apps
- 4) Set Up Backups
- 5) Check Out the Mac App Store to find Useful Apps and Utilities
