Security Meltdown by Bob Moffat

"DON'T PANIC"

--The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy

Meltdown and **Spectre** are the names of a couple of security issues that joined the crowd in January. It appears that these are the result of the way the processor chips were designed, not because of rogue coders looking to infiltrate our machines through viral infection or other malware means. Although, such nefarious scum could attempt to use these processing routines to do us harm.

The vulnerability affects virtually all devices that use the chips we have in our computers, phones, and tablets, no matter which company produced the chips or which company built the devices, or...which software or operating system is in use. It is basically baked into the chip.

There have already been software "patches" issued by Apple, Microsoft, and others which will work around the problem--and more will be released-which work around the processor pitfalls.

The problem is immense, important, and impossible to ignore. It will be resolved. We will survive. The best defense is to keep up on all security updates.

Email from Mary Fleck:

Bob this is a useful tip to know on finding your phone. I have used both ways and they do work.

Find lost phone even if it is on silent.

- 1. Visit <u>iCloud.com</u> and login with your Apple ID. (Android owners use <u>Google Device Manager</u>)
- 2. Choose **"Find My iPhone"** and let the service locate your missing device.
- 3. Select your phone on the map, then click the **(i)** button.
- 4. Choose the **"Play Sound"** option. It will keep making a noise until you unlock it so you don't have to worry about missing the beeps.
- 5. Locate your phone and give it a hug.

Be advised that you should not test this feature if there's a sleeping baby close by. The noise is much louder than I expected and the look my wife gave me is one I hope to never see again.

Ever lose your cellphone and end up having your spouse/ friend/ boyfriend call it so you can follow the sound of your ringtone to the place you last left it? What happens when you lose your phone and no one is around to call it for you? Go to

development. Some old hands in the group referred to the concept as The Aluminum Overcast.

The project required men and women in great numbers to design, build, test, and manage such an undertaking. In the summer of 1966 construction of the Everett plant began: soon what was to become the largest enclosed volume building on the planet appeared. Incredible.

The number of folks working on the project ballooned. Engineering groups left Renton and moved to the Seattle Plant II area and then began to be warehoused in available spaces along East Marginal Way. It was an Incredible situation.

On the second Monday of 1968 yours truly was unpacking office move boxes in a brand new office building at the Everett Plant. A few hundred yards to the west, that gigantic factory was already in the early production stage of the first 747s. To the east was a semi-paved employee parking lot. Our room still smelled of fresh paint. The mustardy colored carpet was chosen because it almost matched the color of the mud that everyone tracked in from the outdoors. The plan was that each week over the next two months another Engineering group would be moved from Seattle to Everett. By March there would be nearly 1800 people in the building. The little town I grew up in had a population of 1025. Incredible.

My responsibility was to act as the satellite supervisor for several administrative functions that were still based in Seattle with the senior management team. Within a couple of months more of those various teams had moved north to support the growing crowd. At this point there were regular Boeing employees as well as contracted "body shop" folks on the job. Folks from around the USA were joined by people from England, Ireland, India, Japan, and several other nations. Parts to build the 747 were being produced in factories around the USA and the world, as well. It was ... incredible.

So, in that morning in January 50 years ago, we were busy trying to organize ourselves to support the first 300 or so engineers that were also unpacking their offices. Our phone was ringing with someone who wanted to schedule a seat on Ping Pong Airlines (the Beech Queen Air that shuttled between

Paine Field and Boeing Field several times a day.) Before we could turn around someone from the Flight Deck group had found our location and was dropping off a drawing for our Engineering Release Unit to certify and send off on the first flight south. Incredible.

The way the calendar works means that ever so often any given month will begin on the same day as that month in many other years. So it is that the New Year's Day falls on Monday this year, just as it did in 1968. While we were unpacking an engineering project the world beyond was in turmoil. The Tet Offensive was just the first of events that buffeted our world. It was an election year and by the time we cast our ballots, the nation had lost Martin Luther King and Robert F. Kennedy. The Viet Nam war had created a contentious division that forever changed us. And on Christmas Eve we listened to Apollo 8's crew, orbiting the Moon, read from Genesis. What an Incredible year it was.

And one September morning in 1968 there came a moment when everyone in all the office buildings on site closed up their desks, locked up the file cabinets, hung up the phones, put on a jacket, and walked several hundred yards to the apron in front of the factory to watch the bay doors roll back. And the R001 "City of Everett" 747 in red and white colors rolled out to make its public debut.

Fifty years ago. Incredible.
