

exercise in thoughtful care. Choosing what I share with whom has always seemed a prudent, intelligent way to move through life.

Privacy has become a topic of some debate as we sink into the global hot-tub of social media, apparently. Now let's admit that anyone who connects to the Internet and begins to browse has given up some claim to absolute anonymity. Anyone who has ever signed up for an account has ceded some secrets in order to complete the form. That was true whether it was filling out paperwork to get a job in 1950 or opening an online account in 2018.

Like the "Social Contract" that citizens used to have with their neighbors, employers, and government, filling out those forms and giving up that info also included some understanding--that our bank was not going to post that data in their lobby, for example. The terms of service that cover how an organization will use our personal data have become extremely legalistic to avoid any misunderstanding that could lead to being sued. Pages of legalese may hide ways the data can be used in ways the poor sap signing up could not imagine.

But wait! There's more!

In today's electronic environment where everything we do online is coded with 1s and 0s, everything we do is trackable, traceable, cookied, and collected. It is what it is. Get over it.

Well, getting over it is not that easy. It turns out that our digital footprints may be pressed into the sand of time rather like the fossil prints of some ancient dinosaur in a sedimentary creek bed. The photo posted by a 17 year old at a "wild" party may stick around to be viewed by a potential employer. In fact, a photo can be modified and posted without the original subject or the photographer knowing that it has been re-purposed.

Privacy is still a concept that needs to be supported, in my opinion. But how have we arrived at this time and place where that is even a question?

The world is a crowded place. The world-wide electronic connections have pressed events up against us from all directions. Perhaps we have incorrectly used the word "social" in social media. After all, these online constructs have removed much of the need to interact with family, friends, and strangers face-to-face. When we post a thought or opinion to a website we don't have to watch someone's facial expression or duck when they take a swing at us for a comment they dislike. Or even have to listen to their opinion of our comment.

With no immediate physical consequences it may have become too easy to just say whatever unfiltered thought springs to mind. For all the warm and wonderful comments to be found there are all too many hurtful and hateful ones.

Filters that most adults develop after the old-fashioned playground taunts or sibling rivalries have taught us (in Kenny Rogers' words) "you got to know when to hold 'em, know when to fold 'em, know when to walk away, know when to run." Privacy considerations in an Internet World make those filters even more important.

There are plenty of drips out there online. There are dupes and dopes, as well. Sadly enough, it appears they may well be parlaying our data to their profit and our loss.

Oh well, it is what it is.

No doubt about it--I am definitely too old to understand.

How to add AirDrop to the Dock in macOS to quickly send files to a nearby iPhone or iPad

AirDrop is one of the quickest and easiest ways to transfer files between macOS and iOS devices, but performing a small change in macOS can make it even simpler to start using straight away. AppleInsider shows how to add this handy file-sharing tool to your Mac's dock, ready to initiate transfers at a moment's notice.


Most people who needed to share files from an iPhone or iPad to a Mac or vice versa will have heard of AirDrop, Apple's application for sending files to nearby devices. So long as both devices have Bluetooth and Wi-Fi turned on, are in range, and don't have any settings enabled to block transfers, it can be used to share photographs, videos, documents, and other files with minimal interaction.

While it is available to access in the Finder in macOS, as well as through the keyboard shortcut Command-Shift-R from the desktop, asking Siri, and Spotlight queries, it is oddly not immediately able to be added to the Dock.

The AirDrop application is well-hidden, though not kept in the usual Applications folder. It is possible to find it, but it's not a straightforward process.
