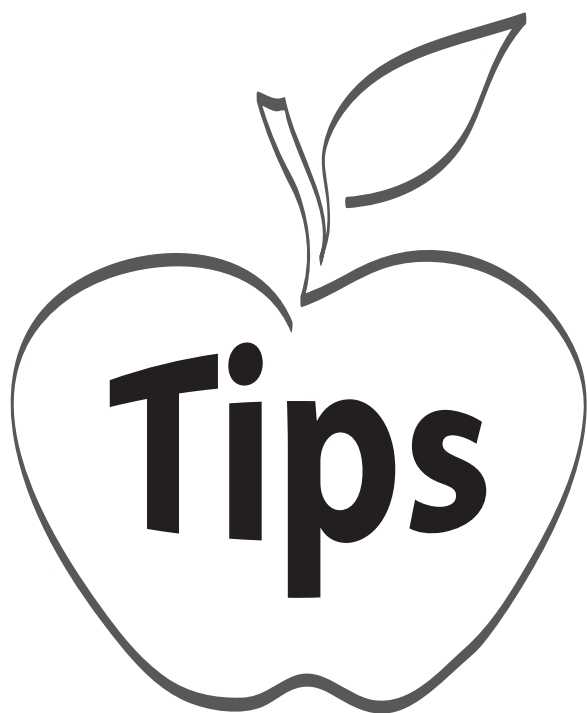

Starting with the ratification of the 18th Amendment (Prohibition) in 1919 at the end of a war-ravaged decade to the jarring Crash of 1929 which lead to a decade of economic hardship and the seeds of more war in the 1930s. Among the milestones of 1939 are: the release of *The Wizard of Oz* movie, availability of a fully automatic Hydra-Matic transmission for GM's Oldsmobile, and the beginning of WWII when Germany invaded Poland.

By the end of the 1940s our world at entered the Atomic Age, the Jet Age, the Television Age, the Transistor Age, and the Computer Age (not to mention the arrival of the microwave oven, Velcro, Tupperware, and The Slinky!)

By 1959 we were marking the first commercial flights of the Boeing 707 and Douglas DC 8, and the U.S. was still racing to catch up to the U.S.S.R.'s Sputnik launched in 1957. Polio vaccine had been developed, coast-to-coast television networks had arrived, and rock'n'roll was in shattering nerves of parents around the world.

We began 1969 a few days after we listened to Astronauts read from Genesis as they orbited the Moon at Christmas 1968. NASA was preparing for the Moon landings of Apollo 11 and 12 by year end. President Nixon was beginning his first term after a tumultuous political era with major civil rights advances as the nation dealt with assassinations, anti-war protests, and major shake-ups in civil, religious, societal, and political life. Boeing's 747 finished flight test and was certified in December. And, almost unnoticed by most folks, the first message sent via ARPANET between computers heralded the beginnings of the Internet.

By 1979 the personal computer age had dawned and Visicalc had become the Apple II "killer app" that would introduce us to spreadsheets. The integrated circuit that had made the Apollo Moon landing possible a decade earlier was transforming devices and industries. A human-powered aircraft, the *Gossamer Albatross*, crossed the English Channel that year.

Ten years later saw the inauguration of George H.W. Bush and some remarkable events around the world: Tiananmen Square in Beijing, the fall of the Berlin Wall, and the first commercial Internet serv-

ice. Also, the first computer virus was released in 1989!

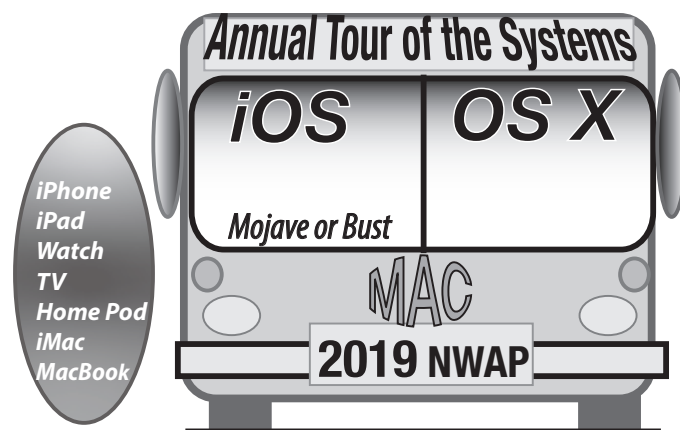
And by the end of the 1990s we had seen the establishment of the Euro, endured the invention of Emojis in Japan, and noted the introduction of HTTP (hypertext transfer protocol) by Tim Berners-Lee—welcome to the World Wide Web! The personal computer had arrived with a bang (and frequently, a crash.). We all held our breath at the end of 1999 to see if all the Windows PCs would survive Y2K (hint: most of them did!)

The 21st Century has increased our electronic interconnections beyond belief. In the first decade we moved from doorstep desktops to laptops and tablets, from cell-phones to smartphones, from CRTs to flat screens, from so many traditional ways to communicate to a bunch of new ways.

We are linked (or is it "hooked") to the world by invisible electronic channels. Have we human beings changed- evolved- improved- as a result?

We mark the beginning of 2019 with the usual mixture of optimism that days will be filled with more light, that the months ahead will be filled with more positive developments, and that by the end of the year, we'll be looking back on a decade(maybe from the passenger seat of a spaceplane?) where the plusses outweigh the minuses.

Let's plan on a few more seconds, a few more minutes of *enlightenment* each day as 2019 unfolds.

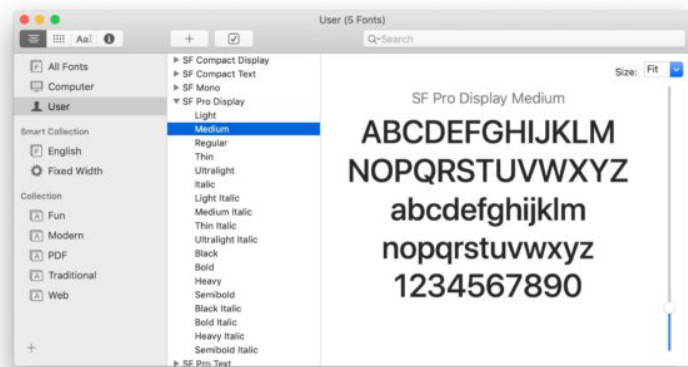

How to Download San Francisco Fonts for Mac



Apple has created a custom font named “San Francisco” for use as the system font in iOS, macOS, tvOS, and watchOS. It’s a gorgeously simple font that is highly legible regardless of what Apple system or display it’s used on, and if you’re a developer or designer you may appreciate having access to the San Francisco font for mockups and other developer related work.

Apple makes the San Francisco font available to download for developer usage. If you’ve installed fonts on Mac OS
