foodstuffs from far, far away on a daily basis. Most of us probably have added veggies or fruit to our regular diets which were rare or unknown to our parents or grandparents. It truly is harvest time somewhere on the Planet Earth every day.

A century ago technology was probably regarded with just about the same amount of shock and awe as it is today. The Model T had goaded the competition into producing affordable autos which pressured government agencies to produce safe, reliable roads. Radio was beginning to introduce folks to voices from other places and other cultures. Motion picture studios were cranking out epics which showed one half how the other half lived.

Many products were still being built at local plants, although national brand marketing had begun to alter the aspirations and inspirations of the young and the restless.

All those pressures that began to alter things in the 1920s led to suburbs from where breadwinners commuted to work (by auto, by interurban transport.) Expectations that problems would be solved by clever inventions sort of became ingrained in our view of life. We looked forward to the next great Labor Saving Device-then as now.

Our Puyallup Valley must have been quite a different place to live in that era. The 1920 population of our Fair City was about 6300 compared to about 37,000 in 2010. I'm guessing there were fewer industrial parks and housing developments back in that day. And probably a smaller percentage of residents commuted to jobs more than a 10 mile ride on the interurban to Tacoma. Wonder if they had the glory of ornamental plantings that we are enjoying today.

Bet they did have dandelions!

A hundred years on and most of us in this community and the surrounding area take for granted a goods, services, infrastructure, communications, and access that is an astounding leap ... forward ... we like to believe.

We rely on autos and trucks that most likely were designed in a different country, produced with parts built in factories around the world. We can order merchandise-domestic and imported-to be delivered to our door within a couple of days from cities across the continent. With all the electronic connections we enjoy today, you have to wonder if the total number of newspapers delivered in the city these days is much larger than it was in 1920.

We came, we saw, we occupied. We prospered. We grew. The land beneath us is largely unchanged. It may be hidden by pavement or buildings. There may be a huge

chunk removed to accommodate a freeway or added to channel a river. And in the Spring we are reminded that seasons change, all systems are GO.

Okay, maybe homes and businesses are scattered from here to breakfast. But on these days, in this month, what a show Mother Nature has put together to remind us that she still is the source of beauty and life. Azaleas, rhodies, dogwoods, and tulips and bluebells have rushed to follow April's Daffodil Parade. We live in a gorgeous part of the country.

Accordingly, an Apple ID is really important if you want to participate in the Apple ecosystem, whether used on iPhone, iPad, iPod touch, Mac, or even Windows with iTunes.
